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- information about children's dislikes and preferences
- Learning experiences are based on individual children's interests
- Children are able to see that their opinions and preferences have a positive influence upon aspects of the environment
- Respectful interactions are modelled by the adults in the setting

Conclusion

Australia, as a signatory to the UNCROC needs to take seriously the involvement of young children in decision making. We need to create a culture which values children's opinions and takes the time to value and nurture the multifaceted nature of children's input. Communication takes many forms and is not

limited to the spoken word.

Fostering participation in a way which matches a child's development and temperament can be assisted by knowledge in child development. Early childhood teachers and others with a background in child development may be an appropriate reference point for this knowledge. It is thus time to consider how all agencies and adults concerned with the promotion and implementation of children's rights, work with each other and in collaboration with children, to share insights and skills into developing effective and responsive strategies to involve all children in relevant decision making.
