CHIEF SUPERINTENDENT JOHN KELLY CRIME CO-ORDINATOR EASTERN DIVISION

Chief Superintendent John Kelly, who was born and raised in Sydney, joined the N.S.W. Police Force in 1961. After serving in general duties in the Daceyville and Randwick areas he transferred to Prosecuting Branch in 1963. He remained there until he joined the former Commonwealth Police in 1969.

Mr Kelly was a law instructor at the Australian Police College, Manly, until early 1977 when he was seconded to serve as Commander, 14th Australian Police Contingent in Cyprus.

On his return, he became Officer in Charge, Diplomatic and Consular

Security and, while serving as Officer in Charge of the A.C.T. District, was involved in the acquisition of the former hostel, Lawley House, as Compol's Training College.

Before the amalgamation Mr Kelly was appointed to the Australian Federal Police Task Force and the Headquarters Planning Group. In July 1980 he became Crime Coordinator, Eastern Division.

In 1972 Chief Superintendent Kelly received the Australian Efficiency Decoration for service in the Army Reserve and in 1977 he was awarded the Queen's Jubilee Medal.

Mr Kelly has a daughter, two sons and two grandsons. His favourite pastimes are sailing and reading.



CHIEF SUPERINTENDENT RAYMOND JOHN McCABE OIC CENTRAL CRIME INTELLIGENCE UNIT

Born in England, Chief Superintendent Raymond McCabe spent his early life in East Africa. He began his career with the Kenya Police in 1950 and worked in both general duties and criminal investigation. He had attained the rank of Assistant Superintendent when he migrated to Australia in 1963.

Chief Superintendent McCabe joined the former Commonwealth Police in February 1964 and served in all the Eastern States. His overseas postings included Saigon, Phnom Penh and Japan where he was officer in charge of the Australian Police Contingent (which included representatives of all Australian police forces) at Expo '70.

From 1974 to 1976 Chief Superintendent McCabe served in Paris as Australian Liaison Officer at Interpol General Secretariat. On his return to Australia he went to Perth as Officer in Charge, Western Division.

In 1957 he was mentioned in despatches to H.M. the Queen for Distinguished Service and in 1968 he was awarded the British Empire Medal for services to the Australian Embassy and staff in Saigon during the "Tet" offensive. He received the Queen's Police Medal in 1978 for Distinguished Police Service and the National Medal in 1979.

Chief Superintendent McCabe is currently serving as Officer in Charge, Central Crime Intelligence Unit. He is married and lists his hobbies as photography and tennis.
