'Dog doc' first home in canine triathlon

The first Police and Service Dog triathlon event was held recently at the Royal Australian Army School of Military Engineering, Moorebank, NSW.

A total of 24 handlers and their dogs took part in the event and entrants came from dog sections of the Australian Federal Police, New South Wales Police, NSW Corrective Services, Royal Australian rmy and Royal Australian Navy.

The event was conducted over a 5 kilometre course and was primarily run on an army assault training ground with both handler and dog having to negotiate obstacles such as barbed wire, logs, cliff faces, pits half-filled with water, swamps and a river crossed by means of a raft constructed from

At the finish line, each team was

required to either locate a hidden narcotic or explosive or carry out a search for and attack a hidden offender.

The course was run against the clock with time penalties being imposed for failure by the dog or handler to negotiate any section of

Participants also were handicap-

ped according to their age.

The event was won by Captain R. Cooksley, of the British Army Veterinary Corps, who is currently on secondment to the Australian Army, and his dog Fonzie. They covered the gruelling course in 19 min. 10 sec.

Before his arrival in Australia, Captain Cooksley had participated in a similar event in West Germany where entrants had attended from the United States and countries from all over western Europe.

ACT club to host Police golf titles for the third time

"One of the major headaches will be to raise the \$10,000 difference between revenue raised from entry fees and the actual cost of running the tournament and providing an extensive array of trophies.

Another major organisation job was the club's recent annual charity day at Yowani Country Club which, as 'Platypus' advised in the last issue, raised \$1,500 for a Canberra charity.

The event attracted 200 entries—

somewhat down on previous years as a number of police entrants from Mittagong, Cooma and other nearby areas were manning NSW prisons during a prison officers' strike.
