

Flying High

THE AFP Aero Club is taking part in the Hinkler Bicentennial Air Race around Queensland this month.

Sergeant Bill Haldane (Traffic ACT) and First Constable Lindsay Walsh (Special Projects ACT) are flying in the nine day event through Charleville, Charters Towers, Cairns, Mount Isa, Longreach, Bundaberg and other centres.

The Club was formed with 10 members in June last year. The membership has since jumped to 23 with members in the regions as well as Canberra.

There are reciprocal rights with state police force aero clubs.

The club held a 'fly-in' to Corowa on February 13 and 14 with the Victoria Police Aero Club.

At least 30 pairs of eyes in the immediate area shifted nervously back and forth between Harry and his target, all knowing the importance of the one single event that could alter history's page.

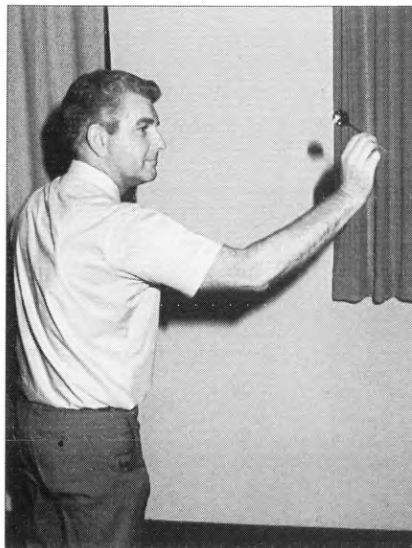
Would he make it?
