## **Barrister**



Barristers are required to have academic and practical training, as do solicitors. In the NT barristers may practise as solicitors as we have what is known as a "fused" profession. A barrister's work constitutes two types: advocacy, which involves the presentation of a case in court, after being briefed by a solicitor; and out of court work which may involve giving specialist advice (opinion) or preparation of documents relating to litigation.

The Darwin Community Legal Service's Legal Advice Sessions have been running well during the past year with 1386 clients advised in the 1993/94 fiscal period. These sessions help people with legal problems by giving legal advice, referring to other, appropriate agencies or helping people in a "do it yourself" fashion.

DCLS Volunteer Service would like to thank all of their volunteers over the past year your time has been invaluable. We currently have 64 volunteers on our books but we need more to cover our sessions which are held at three locations (Palmerston, Casuarina and Darwin) each week. Alice Community Legal Information Centre has been in existence now for nearly two years.
