The Honourable Mr Justice Roderick Meagher of the NSW Court of Appeal will deliver the Martin Kriewaldt Memorial Address on Thursday 29 August at 5pm in Court 1 of the Supreme Court of the Northern Territory. As his topic for the 1996 lecture, the speaker has selected "Civil Rights: Some Random Views".


Justice Meagher was admitted to the NSW Bar in 1960 and was appointed Queen's Counsel in 1974. He served as President of the NSW Bar Association from 1979 until 1981. His appointment to the NSW Court of Appeal came in 1989.

Justice Meagher has been a lecturer in the Faculty of Law at the University of Sydney since 1960 and is the Challis lecturer in Equity and Roman Law. His acheivements in the publishing arena include co-editorship of Jacobs' *Law of Trusts*, 2nd - 5th editions and co-authorship of Meagher, Gummow and Lehane, *Equity, Doctrines and Remedies*.

The Martin Kriewaldt Memorial Address is delivered biennially and previous speakers have been Lord Oliver of Aylmerton in 1992 and NSW Chief Justice Gleeson in 1994.
