

The Attorney-General has released a discussion paper which deals with a number of significant issues in respect of conveyancing in the Territory.

Specifically the discussion paper canvasses vendor disclosure proposals, a discussion on whether to limit acting for both parties to a conveyancing transaction and the question of the prescription of a standard contract.

I urge practitioners either to respond to the paper directly or to forward responses to the Society so that a coordinated response may be made.

You will be aware that as part of the Federal Budget the Government announced large increases in fees payable in the High Court of Australia.

I advise that on 19 June 1997 the Senate disallowed the Regulations providing for that increase.

The Law Society recently received a rough draft of proposed Criminal Practice Rules which the judges are presently considering. The draft has not been settled by Parliamentary Counsel, and is intended to be read as instructions to Parliamentary Counsel. The Hon Justice Mildren has asked for any suggestions on the rough draft and asks further that ambiguities in it should be drawn to his attention.

As suggestions are required by 18 July, any practitioner interested in seeing and commenting on this document should contact the Society to obtain a copy.
