
PEOPLE AND THE LAW

Who are your role models? Alex Harvey during his sensational Alex Harvey Band heyday. Pretty fly for a white guy and an inspiration for those of us in our forties.


Your favourite place in the NT? Jabiru public swimming pool. Nirvana for the zen lap swimmer.
