n 7 March 2014 the Northern Territory Women's Lawyers Association in partnership with the NT Anti-Discrimination Commission hosted a breakfast in celebration of International Women's Day. The breakfast was aptly titled 'You may ask yourself, how did I get here?' which was based on the theme for International Women's Day 2014 'Inspiring Change'.

The focus of International Women's Day this year was that 'women's equality has made positive gains but the world is still unequal. International Women's Day celebrates the social, political and economic achievements of women while focusing world attention on areas requiring further action.'

The breakfast was held at the Novatel Atrium on the Esplanade

Sandra Markman gave us a hilarious account of what it's like to be a legislation drafter and the importance of supporting our female colleagues.
