Huge hauls—drugs by the tonne

oordination of resources and assets within and outside Customs and with the cooperative efforts between agencies has resulted recently in the seizure of record amounts of narcotics.

A series of drug operations by Customs and the Australian Federal Police (AFP) saw the seizure of more than 1500kg of amphetamines and cocaine in a 10week period.

Australia's largest cocaine haul was made on 27 July when AFP and Customs officers seized more than a tonne of cocaine on the central Western Australia coast at Dulverton Bay (Operation Feria).

Just nine days
earlier, in a Customsled operation
(Barney), more than
400kg of

including ecstasy

Queensland's

Another joint
Customs and AFP

operation – Operation Montego – saw the seizure of 90kg of cocaine off the coast of Brisbane near Moreton Island in May.

The operation was the culmination of nearly two years of investigation by the AFP and Australian Customs and involved significant assistance from the Queensland Police Service, police and customs in New Caledonia and US Customs

The Western Australian drug haul was the result of a two-month investigation by the AFP, which became a joint operation with Customs.

From the time the vessel was first sighted off the Western Australian coast, Customs Coastwatch maintained continuous visual and electronic surveillance. This included the unloading of the drugs on to shore at Dulverton Bay some 45 hours later.

In addition to the seizure of the drugs, five people were charged in relation to the importation.

Operation Barney, on the Sunshine Coast, was the result of an 11-month investigation by Customs. The operation, with the assistance



of the Australian Federal Police, netted a variety of drugs. The haul included: more than a million amphetamine tablets; almost half a million methamphatamine tablets; 152 kg of crystal ice (methamphetamine); and 4000 tablets of methylenedioxymethamphetamine (MDMA) - commonly known as ecstasy.

A call about suspicious activity to the Customs Watch free phone number provided a small piece of information that turned into the record seizure of amphetamines.

From the time the information was provided, Customs officers from Cairns to Canberra monitored activities of individuals. This led to the identification of the yacht from which the drugs were seized. The AFP was kept informed of the operation and was called in to assist immediately a link to narcotics was made.
