A TRIBUTE

The Honourable Justice Leonie Glynn

eone Carmel Glynn was appointed а member of the Industrial Commission of New South Wales on 14 April 1980. She now celebrates 20 years on the Bench, as the longest serving female Superior Court Judge in this state. This modest Senior Justice is also the longest serving member of the Industrial Relations Commission of NSW.



She was appointed and served as a Conciliation Commissioner on the Industrial Commission of NSW from 1976 to 1980 and in 1980 was then appointed as a Judicial Member of the Commission.

Indicative of her long and fruitful service on the bench is Justice Glynn's recent report from an

inquiry into 'pay equity'. The report deals with questions of undervaluation of women's work, and is a comprehensive guide to applications when award adjustments on this basis are sought and a further guide to the legislative changes necessary to facilitate the process of such applications.

Justice Glynn is a most private judicial officer. Friends, however, speak of her love of travel, devotion to family and love of the written word.

Justice Glynn was educated at St Ursula's College, Armidale and then completed a Bachelor of Arts at the University of Sydney. She then studied and completed the Barristers' Admission Board exams, before being admitted to the Bar in NSW in 1964. She has also achieved a Master of Science from Columbia University and served as a legal librarian to the NSW Supreme Court from 1954 to 1976.
