familiar with the Articles of Association; but it is no part of an auditor's duty to give advice; nor is the auditor to be a detective. He should always commence with the assumption that the officers whose books he is to inspect are honest; and he will not be guilty of negligence if, in the absence of suspicious circumstances, he relies upon the statements of trusted officers. These are some of the deductions the author concludes are to be drawn from the decided cases.

The legal decisions on the distribution of dividends and on secret reserves will be found useful, as will the section on the auditing of accounting systems adopted by solicitors. In short, *Practical Auditing* will undoubtedly become an important book of reference for the student of company law, accountancy and auditing.
