NZLA/LAA Conference/UCLS seminar

PLANNING for the seminar, 'Are tertiary ibraries effective?', is well advanced. The program has been finalised but speakers have

yet to be approached.

The seminar has been designed to allow for as much participative discussion in a workshop environment as possible. In the morning, a general session conducted by a panel of three will cover introductory material including what 'effectiveness' means, if it can be measured, the role of standards and objecives, and the concept of cost-effectiveness. In the latter part of the morning, there will be our concurrent sessions in each of which a speaker will deliver a short paper and the rest of the time will be conducted as a workshop. The topics of the concurrent sessions will be Assessing effective utilisation of staff and nternal barriers to organisational effectiveness; Ways of measuring and improving collection adequacy; Techniques for assessng user perceptions and user success in the ibrary; Barriers to individual effectiveness in he helping services.

In the afternoon session, all participants will come together to hear summaries of each of the four papers and workshop sessions, and or discussion. In all, we predict that the seminar will be interesting enough to delay 'CLS members' departure for scenic tours of
