NSW SPECIALS

A ONE-DAY word processing seminar attracted approximately 100 librarians on 17 June at the University of Sydney Union. A Remington NBI 3000 was available for demonstration purposes.

The first speaker, Don James, Principal Consultant, Word Management Pty Ltd, pointed out that WPs were fast being overtaken by mini computers which could be made capable of talking to each other, despite inital incompatibility.

Mike Middleton from University of NSW School of Librarianship, then tempered the interest generated by the first speaker, when suggesting cost-benefit analysis might indicate that libraries manual systems were cheaper than conversion to machine-readable systems. An audience query raised the question: if card catalogues were abandoned, how was NUCOM to be economically informed of additions to a library's collection, when there is no 'card' by-product from the Com-fiche catalogue?

Three librarians described how they used WPs: Meryl McCracken (PTC) for library cards and accession list; Beverly Caska (Stephen Jaques and Stephen) for a one-line per entry printed catalogue; Rosemary McLauchlan (Commonwealth Bank) for tabulated data retrieval.

The last question from the audience related to the occupational hazards of VDT's. Further information on this subject will be published in a future edition of ASLN. S.K. Bevan

NSW PUBLIC LIBRARIES

AT a recent activity organised by the NSW Public Libraries Group speakers described current developments and emerging problems in the computerisation of library services and operations.

The speakers were Allen Hall, Kuring-gai CAE; Barry Price, Chief Librarian at Hornsby Shire Library; Richard Nichols from the State Library's Public Library Division, and Ms M. Beamish, Ryde Public Library's Deputy Chief Librarian.

The speakers appeared to agree that although computerisation does not lead to a loss of jobs, the increase in the rate of creation of new jobs, however, is lowered.

Ms Beamish addressed herself to this problem and provided statistics to back the proposition.

Mr Price spoke in favour of automation. He told how his staff had developed a greater unity and service had improved after computerisation.

In his talk Mr Hall stressed the need for library workers to be acquainted, at least theoretically, with computers. Mr Nichols made various significant points in his talk.

The activity was held at the Belrose Branch of Warringah Library. The Branch Librarian there, Ms June Cunningham, gave a talk describing the library and its history.
