NSW SCHOOL LIBRARIES

OVER 70 people participated in a recent one-day seminar of the LAA School Libraries Section NSW Group on the theme 'Resource co-ordination and librarians' groups'. Participants from 10 of the 11 NSW regions, included school librarians, consultants and educational administrators.

Under the general title 'Sharing the range of experiences', five people gave short talks and answered questions on some locally-based initiatives in which they are involved. These included local area KWOC lists of periodicals and audiovisual materials, Western Region's Resources Directory, a group of schools sharing personal development materials, the long term effects of the North Sydney Region Task Force and current developments in the NICS scheme on the North Coast.

Participants then had an opportunity to discuss problems faced by local area librarians' groups together with possible solutions. The six workshop groups for this session came up with a variety of helpful suggestions. Several of the administrators asked if they could have copies of these as soon as possible.

Three regional administrators then presented their thoughts on resource co-ordination and librarians' groups. Les Davis (South Coast) described the newly formed South Coast Regional Learning Resources Co-ordinating Committee and stressed the importance of regional representation on such committees. Bill Gregory outlined draft guidelines for resource sharing in Metropolitan West Region.

From Liverpool Region Frank Meaney emphasised the importance of gaining the support of principals, the need for librarians to understand how decisions are made at regional and local levels, and avenues open to schools librarians, such as Principals' conferences for presenting their views and gaining further support.

In the second workshop session participants broke into regional groups to discuss district and regional co-operation and priorities for future action. These were then communicated to the total group in the final plenary session.

The seminar program was a very full one and participants seemed to find it a very informative day. The proceedings of the day, together with extensive material about current regional developments collected prior to the day will be published later in the year. Details of that publication will be publicised in *Incite* when it is available.

Conference

THE Australian Section of IBBY is planning to hold a conference in 1981, the Year of the Disabled.

Librarians stage stopwork meeting

OVER 600 library workers from municipal and shire libraries throughout NSW attended a stopwork meeting at Ashfield Town Hall on 2 July.

The meeting was called by the Municipal Employees Union as a result of protests by shiftworkers to alterations to shiftwork allowances granted by Commissioner Glynn in a recent award variation which granted overall increases to library staff.

In the past shiftworkers were paid shift allowances on a weekly basis of \$30.40 per week. This was amended in the new variation to provide a payment of \$7.50 per shift with a minimum payment of \$22.50 (three shifts) per week.

The meeting, heated at times, voted overwhelmingly to ask the Municipal Employees Union to lodge an appeal on behalf of library staff against this decision. An appeal has been lodged with a date yet to be set.
