More about prices

LAST year in The Source (*AustLibJ*, v28, no18, 19 October 1979) I mentioned a submission to the NSW Prices Commission on book prices by three lecturers from the University of New South Wales.

This submission was particularly scathing about the activities of the University Co-op Bookshop. Not unnaturally the University Co-op also made submissions to the Commission, and I have been able to read their 288-page printed submission. It is an excellent insider's view of the operations of a complex academic bookseller and a good foil to the Nicholas, Shergold and Meredith paper.

The Co-op submission contains useful background views on the book industry in Australia, in particular the tertiary market and the closed market. Incidentally copies of submissions to the Commission are available for public perusal in the Library of the NSW Department of Consumer Affairs in Sydney.

Computer games

THE Carringbush Regional Library at Richmond, Victoria, has two computer terminals available for its readers' use.

The terminals are linked to the computer of Richmond Technical College, and can be used for mathematical, English and other programs, as well as computer games. The system uses the computer language BASIC and users can learn to write and store their own programs.

Privacy, US style

DEFENCES of privacy from Warren and Brandeis' landmark article in 4 *Harvard Law Review* (1890) to the present are covered in David M. O'Brien's *The right to privacy*.

This 55-page bibliography includes references to articles, government documents and publications, and Supreme Court cases. The items listed deal mainly with personal privacy within the United States, but there are a number of references to comparative and cross-cultural studies on the topic.

Crammed into 16 pages of a recent issue were news of NUCOM, serial donations, Indonesian acquisitions, subscription rates for NLA publications, news of APAIS hard copy and online, the Lopez collection, SALSSAH 'widely held' titles, and much more. *ROD news* is surprisingly readable and very informative. Yellow-backs on film

AROUND 3000 dime novels are in a collection which is currently being published on microfilm by University Microfilms. The dime novels, popular escape fiction of the 19th century, were pocket-sized paperbound books which enjoyed wide readership.

The majority of titles in this microfilm collection were published by Beadle and Adams, who dominated the 10¢ novel market with their ubiquitous 'yellow-backs'.

The Dime Novel collection will be published in seven sections between June this year and late 1981. The complete collection, which is on 35 mm microfilm, costs US\$5290.


