Public Libraries Group meet Premier

HE PREMIER OF NSW, Mr Neville Wran, has indicated that the government is looking into ways of assisting with public libraries' capital works programs.

During an hour-long meeting with Mr Wran, delegates from the LAA NSW Public Libraries Group discussed four main points about public library service in NSW - Per capita subsidies and special grants; financing of capital works; co-operation; and public library service to the handicapped. Much of the discussion was spent exploring ways in which the state government could help foster co-operation between public libraries. Mr Wran was especially interested in the problems of service to the handicapped.

The delegation consisted of Margaret Whittaker (President of the LAA NSW Public Libraries Group); Carol Small (Manly Li-brary); Richard Drake (Wollongong City Librarian) and Merilyn Bryce (LAA NSW Branch President).

Margaret Whittaker said that 'The meeting with Mr Wran was certainly a success and helped to establish a working relationship. We will be able, next time, to discuss fine details of proposals'

The Public Libraries Group intends to meet with the government each year to discuss public libraries in the state. Mrs Whittaker said Mr Wran had welcomed this during the discussions.
