Libraries in isolation

THE 'Libraries in Isolation' conference will be held in Alice Springs from 4-6 September 1981. The conference will examine the needs of library staff and users in geographically isolated areas as well as people isolated through disablement or different cultural backgrounds.

The conference, sponsored jointly by the LAA NT Branch and the School Library Association of the NT has a program designed to involve professional and para-professional staffs in public, special and school libraries.

Public library service to the isolated will be examined by the NT Director of Library Services, Ron Davis and by Charles Emerton

of the Goulburn Valley Regional Library Service, Vic.

Bryan Yates, from the Technical Services Division of NLA, will explain how technology can reduce isolation.

The education and training needs of library staff will be examined by Edward Reid-Smith (Riverina CAE) and Beryl Turner (Adelaide College of the Arts and Education).

Two librarians will discuss isolation problems — Peter Russell (CSIRO, Black Mountain, ACT) will examine special libraries and Ann Stanley (Education Department, SA), school libraries.

A highlight of the conference will be the closing session on library services and the disabled. Miss Michelle Castagna, NT government representative on the national committee for the IYDP, will examine needs as perceived by disabled people themselves.

Dr Graham Corr from Melbourne State College will draw on experiences from a recent study visit to the USA and the UK, to examine 'Librarianship, education and the disabled'.

Comparing religions

The Schools Commission has awarded a grant of \$843 to Mr John Hirst, formerly teacher-librarian of Patrician Brothers High School, Granville, NSW, as part of its Innovations Program.
