AUDIOVISUAL COMMITTEE NEWS

NHE COMMITTEE HAS completed the 'Document on the National Bibliographic Organisation of Nonbook Materials in Australia', which has been forwarded to the Library Association of Australia for official endorsement. Many of the concepts included in the statement derived from the workshop on 'National Bibliographic Control of Nonbook Materials' which the Committee conducted during the LAA Conference in Canberra in 1979.

The Committee is continuing its work in the development of policies relating to Copyright in Nonbook Material. A draft statement circulated by the Executive Director of the LAA on behalf of the Committee, to various branches and sections of the association, drew many useful comments. In revising the statement the Committee is taking these comments into account.

The Committee is currently working on the preparation of guidelines on packaging nonbook materials for distribution to publishers.

Readers of Incite should note that the Inter-Library Loan Code for Nonbook Materials, prepared by the Committee, is available



from the Library Association of Australia, free of charge. The Committee is interested to receive comments from users of the code on its appropriateness.

Dianella shows how it's done

IANELLA PUBLIC LIBRARY, WA, is helping disabled children in the area with its collection of 300 cassette stories and 100 films which children, parents and teachers can borrow. Cassette listening equipment and filmstrip viewers are also available for loan. Borrowers who are unsure about how to operate the equipment are given a demonstration by the recently appointed Children's Specialist Librarian, Nola Buralli.

The Dianella Library was asked to house the handicapped children's collection by the Advisory Council on Library Services for the Handicapped in WA.

Through a grant from the International Year of the Child Committee, ACLSH aims to provide three small pilot projects - two at public libraries (Nedlands and Dianella), and the third at the Library Board of WA.
