Australian Gallery's activities


The Australian National Gallery, home of the National Collection, will open to the public on 13 October 1982. Acquisition of library materials has been a part of the Australian Gallery's activities from its earliest days.

The Gallery now boasts a considerable research library covering the visual and decorative arts world-wide with specialisations matching those of the art collection. The library is therefore particularly strong in the literature of contemporary art, Australian art, photography as well as primitive art and theatre design.

In addition to the normal reference services, library staff have just begun to produce the *Australian Art Index*, which will cover exhibitions, journal articles, monographs and artists' profiles. It will be available through Ausinet or on microfiche for use in libraries throughout Australia.

Access to the library is available to Gallery staff, to bona fide scholars by appointment and through the Inter-Library Loan system.

Award Winner

The *Carringbush News* has been awarded the Australian Library Promotion Council's National Award for the best printed publication in their 1982 Public Relations Awards.

The award was announced tonight at the launching of Australian Library Week in Hobart. Jan Stretton, Carringbush's promotions librarian, accepted the award.

Carringbush News is produced 8 times a year and all production is done within the library. It is distributed free throughout the Carringbush community (the cities of Richmond and Collingwood).

Since its opening in 1977, Carringbush Regional Library has been regarded as an innovator in the provision of library services which extend much further than simple book lending. These services, along with *Carringbush News*, include public access computing facilities, seminars, classes, full audio-visual services, printing, foreign language resources (including the first computer produced Greek catalogue in the world), meeting and theatre facilities, and full-time holiday programs for children.
