A subscription to Infoline is the key to a 15 million media reports information bank. This is updated from Australia's major papers and magazines, its major reference and business sources. Papers such as the Australian Financial Review, the Sydney Morning Herald and the Business Review Weekly are analysed daily by a team of trained librarians.

U. of Q. PERCAT.

The University of Queensland has completed retrospective conversion of its machine readable serials database. The file holds full cataloguing data in accordance with AACR2 for the Library's 30,000 serial titles. A microfiche author, title and subject catalogue (known as PERCAT) has been produced and the data is available on-line via terminals connected to the Library's Online lending system (ACHILLES).

A cataloguing module, to be called ULYSSES (University Library System for the Satisfaction of EnquirieS) is linked to the ACHILLES software. It provides for catalogue record creation and on-line enquiry. Present efforts will lead to the provision of software for on-line public access by the end of 1984. Until then catalogue information for monographs and serials will be available on-line for Technical Services staff and to library staff in Central and most branch libraries. Griffith University, which is a joint user of ACHILLES, also has on-line access to the database.

The PERCAT database is available for sale and could be of interest to any library or co-operative facility which wishes to convert its serial records to AACR2. The 30,000 titles include most core journals in arts (including music), social sciences, science, engineering, architecture, medicine, dentistry, veterinary science and law. Environment statements

Commonwealth to support ACHPIRST

The Commonwealth Minister for Recreation, Sport and Tourism Mr John Brown has announced the first Commonwealth funding support for the Australian Clearing House for Publications in Recreation, Sport and Tourism (ACHPIRST).

For 1983-84, \$7,500 has been allocated to supplement existing funding support from the States and Territories of Australia ACHPIRST which is based at Melbourne's Footscray Institute of Technology Library was established in 1982 at the initiative of FIT Chief Librarian Alan Bundy to system atically collect and record all Australiar documentation in recreation, sport and tour ism. It has been producing the Australian Leisure Index since the beginning of this year, and in November its records will be available through the online equivalent Ausinet's LeisureLine.

Alan says that although it has taken a long time to have the Commonwealth recognise ACHPIRST's national value in a tangible way they're very pleased a break through has been achieved and welcome Mi Brown's personal interest in the development.

The Centre for Library Systems (CLS), Kur ing-gai College of Advanced Education, ha completed a study evaluating the use of the KWOC system managed by the CLS in twelve secondary school libraries in NSW The libraries included in the evaluation had been using the system for more than twelve months at the time of the study and applica tions include using KWOC as a single-pur pose index to a special collection, as catalog to the entire library collection or a a catalog to the school's total resources irre spective of where these resources are housed.
