On 13 August the Public Libraries Section (S.A. Branch) presented a discussion on 'Public Relations and Promotion for Public Libraries', held at the Walkerville Public Library.

The first speaker was Mr Laurie McCann, Publicity Officer of the Library Promotion Committee (SA), who explained the role of the Australian Library Promotion Council and its importance to public libraries. He also showed two library promotional films, one from Adelaide and one from Los Angeles.

The next speaker was Mr Philip Pike, Public Relations and Promotions Officer for the State Library of South Australia, who explained the use of commercial marketing techniques which could be adapted for promoting public libraries (allowing that public libraries did not have the resources of Coca-Cola).

COMMUNICATING WITH CLIENTS - A Two Day Workshop planned by the NSW Special Libraries Section.

Communication is one of the most important skills in which special librarians, and librarians in general, need to excel to provide an efficient service for their clients. We've all experienced the time that can be wasted when we get the wrong message from our customers

To help librarians sharpen up their communication skills the NSW Special Libraries Section is holding an intensive two day workshop, Thursday and Friday, 29-30 November, conducted by Mr Warick Rowell, an experienced management trainer. Aimed at

building and testing practical skills the workshop will identify the key elements of successful communication such as listening, drawing out, giving and receiving feedback, paraphrasing and body language, and using role play techniques and give an opportunity to practice these skills in a variety of situations. The use of video will give you an opportunity to see your impact on other people. Applying these skills to actual situations when you return to work will be explored.

The fee for the workshop will be \$130 for LAA members and \$165 for non-members. Attendance will be limited to 20 due to the intensive nature of the training given. We will issue a manual with notes to all participants. Lunches are included.

#### FAR NORTH COAST REGION NSW

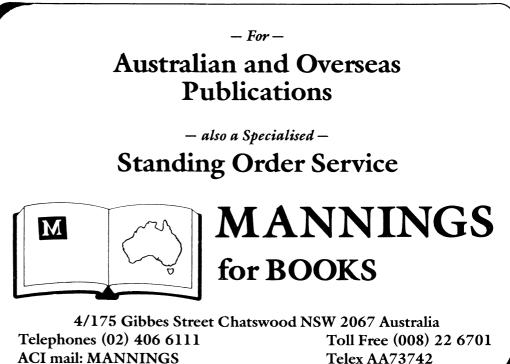
'An exceptional event!' summarised comment on Richard Hoggart's visit to Lismore, following the LAA/NZLA Conference in Brisbane.
