HONORARY AWARDS

H.C.L. Anderson Award

The General Council may confer the H.C.L. Anderson Award on any person who is a professional member of the Association or who holds an overseas qualification in librarianship or archives which is recognised as a professional qualification by a library association or archives association in the country concerned, and who has rendered outstanding service to librarianship or to the library profession in Australia, or to the Library Association of Australia, or to the theory or practice of librarianship.

Redmond Barry Award

The General Council may confer the Redmond Barry Award on any lay person who is not eligible to be a professional member of the Association and who is not employed in a library who, in the opinion of General Council, has rendered outstanding service to the promotion of a library or of libraries, to the Association, to the theory or practice of librarianship, or to an associated field such as bibliography.

Ellinor Archer Award

The General Council may confer the Award on any person employed or who has been employed in libraries, who is not eligible for Associateship of the LAA, who has rendered outstanding service to a library or libraries, the promotion of a library, or libraries, to the theory or practice of librarianship or to an associated field such as systems, conservation, management or bibliography.

Letter of recognition

The General Council will on the recommendation of the Honorary Awards Committee present a Letter of Recognition to a person or an institution or organisation who has rendered a significant, specific service to a library or libraries, to the Library Association of Australia or to the promotion or development of libraries or library science or who has over a period demonstrated significant service well over the call of duty in these fields.

Nominations

Members or Divisions of the Association may make a recommendation that an honorary award be conferred by writing confidentially to Warren Horton, Convenor LAA Honorary Awards Committee, C/- Library Council of Victoria, 328 Swanston Street, Melbourne Vic. 3000.

Confidentiality

It is essential that nominees should NOT be aware that they are being nominated for an award. Nominations are considered by the Honorary Awards Committee and Council in committee, and details are published only when the nomination is successful.

Divisions of the Association particularly are asked not to note nominations in their agenda papers or minutes. Disclosure of such details can prejudice a nomination.

Nominations for the H.C.L. Anderson Award, Redmond Barry Award and Ellinor Archer Award close on **Friday 8 March 1985.** Nominations for Letters of Recognition may be made at any time, and will be considered at the first available meeting of the Honorary Awards Committee.

NATIONAL LANGUAGE POLICY

The Senate Standing Committee on Education and the Arts has published its Report on a National Language Policy (AGPS 1984).

The report covers such issues as library holdings in languages other than English and of materials for teaching English as a second language. It also includes library services for the disabled and library staffing and consultation.

Of the 117 recommendations in the report, 5 are specifically related to libraries:

Recommendation 107: The Commonwealth Government should consider providing additional funds to public libraries to increase their holdings of materials and services for minority linguistic groups, providing that the State Governments maintain their current efforts in this area. (paragraph 13.9)

Recommendation 108: State and public libraries and the State Government bodies responsible for adult migrant education should discuss the provision of materials and services for learners of English as a second language, with a view to determining, and providing, adequate library services. (paragraph 13.10)

Recommendation 109: The Commonwealth Government and State Governments should establish a comprehensive national program of library services for persons with communication handicaps. (paragraph 13.14)

Recommendation 110: State library bodies and public libraries should adopt the reacommendations of the Standard for Multicultural Public Library Service concerning staff development and training. (paragraph 13.18)

Recommendation 111: Library authorities in all States and Territories should make provision for regular consultation with ethnic, Aboriginal and handicapped groups. (paragraph 13.19)

The recommendations will be of great assistance to the Public Library Funding Coordinating Group in their campaign for better funding for public libraries.

LandSearch takes off

An important new reference tool for those interested in the landscape industry is about to be introduced. Called *LandSearch*, it will be the first subject index to the periodical literature of landscape architecture, and will provide references to recently published articles from approximately 100 journals in the fields of landscape planning, design, construction, history and related disciplines. Coverage will be worldwide and will include the journals of major commercial publishers as well as those of professional institutes.

The index will be useful for those involved in landscape theory and research, landscape gardening and contracting, park planning and management, sportsground design and maintenance, interior landscape work, landscape management and science, and land rehabilitation and conservation.

LandSearch will be produced quarterly, with annual cumulations. The first issue will be available in April 1985.
