# RIVERINA REGIONAL GROUP

#### Sex roles, sexism

The group recently hosted a 24-hour visit to Wagga Wagga by Kari Skjonsberg, a Senior Lecturer in the Norwegian School of Library and Information Science. Kari spoke to a group of 40 at a dinner meeting (attended by residential school students, lecturers, and librarians from as far afield as Temora) on Sex Roles in Children's Literature, a topic for which she has gained an international reputation. She told the group that, starting in 1960, she and her students analysed hundreds of children's books for their portrayal of stereotype sex roles; this analysis was the forerunner to a variety of actions undertaken in order to prevent the publication of blatantly sexist writing for children both in Scandinavia and on an international basis. She and her cohorts feel they have the situation under control, at least in Norway.

Kari's other major talk while here was an open meeting on 'Quotas in favour of women in politics, education and the labor market'. An ardent feminist, Kari's views on this topic were also aired on 2AAA-FM, ABC Radio 2CO, and the local commercial TV channel, RVN2. David Foster's interview for his 'At Home' programme was particularly well considered and covered a wide range of feminist and women's issues. It was of particular interest in that Norway was holding a general election that day, and a Labor win would have ensured greater representation in parliament for women - as a party, it has pledged a minimum of 40% women and 40% men as candidates on its slate. While in Australia, Kari will also address the Human Rights Commission, NSW parliamentary women, the IBBY Conference in Perth, and a number of other interested groups.

Activities for the remainder of this year include a dinner meeting in Wagga Wagga, where John Mills and James Henri will be speaking on their recent experiences in the United States of America and Canada.

Finally, a highlight of the year will be our biennial joint meeting of the NSW and Victorian Branch Councils, to be held this time in Albury on 23 and 24 November.

The programme includes two panel discussions. On Saturday the topic is 'The Practicum in library education and in the field', probable panellists being Keith Davison, Marian Brown and Alison Griffith. The subject under discussion on Sunday is 'Creating the attitude and environment for professional development in libraries' with the likely participants being Alison Crook, Helen Sharpe and Anne Burnett.
