Courses on marketing, lobbying, communication techniques, online searching, videotex, school library management, and reader education, a teleconference and distance package are among the continuing education activities to be offered as part of the LAA's nationally funded program in 1986.

Tenders for continuing education activities were called in August after requests from branches and divisions were received in June and July. Despite the Sydney mail strike, tenders were received from 18 organisations for a total of 26 activities. They came from a range of organisations including management and consulting organisations, library and information studies schools, continuing education units of educational institutions, large libraries and LAA branches.

Funds provided to tenderers are meant to cover the development, implementation and evaluation of activities. The fees charged are set by the CE Committee and remitted to the Association's CE account. The activities funded are those which divisions have indicated as priority areas but which cannot be mounted without additional funds or expertise.

After evaluating the tenders and matching branch and divisions' requests with tenders received, the CE Committee recommended to the Board of Education that a minimum of 17 activities be funded. Negotiations are continuing with two tenders, so this number may be higher. In some cases, too, the Committee

recommended funding a 'first run' of a course and if this is successful, a repeat of the course will be funded in another location.

Offers to successful tenderers were sent early in November. There may still be some 'late bids' in some states.

The activities for which the Committee has offered funds to tenders are as follows:

The Northern Territory did not request any funds due to the involvement of members in the Darwin conference. Two divisions in Western Australia sought funds for fairly specific courses for which no tenders have ye been received. The CE Committee was also disappointed that no tender was received for the 'Acquisition Procedures' course in Victoria as this seems to be an area of consisten need. Late bids in all these areas will be considered by the CE Committee.

On the whole the CE Committee and Board of Education were very pleased with the range, quality and 'fundability' of tender received for 1986 activities and progress o courses in 1985. LAA members in most states should be able to make use of a wide range o expertise in 1986.
