Another continuing education project was the National Seminar on Learning Resources for the Health Sciences in Australia held by the South Australian College of Advanced Education Library in conjunction with the South Australian Branch at the Sturt Campus Library. This was well attended and a great success.

As Jubilee 150 approaches, so the Branch will be involved in various projects. The Secretary and President were invited to the launching of the Professions Jubilee Project in July. 
