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
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## **OBITUARY**

### Guna Kulnieks

Guna Kulnieks, Technical Services Libraria at the Carlton Campus of the Melbourne CA died on 24 January, after a short illness.

Guna retired from her position in August la: year for reasons of ill health. She joined th College as a cataloguing librarian in Februar 1969 when two colleges, the Second Teacher College and the Primary Teachers' Colleg were there. Subsequently, in 1974 after th new library building had been occupied, Gun was appointed Senior Cataloguing Librarian replacing Jean Tindall, with responsibiliti $\epsilon$ for merging the two formerly separated de partments and for integrating the tw collections.

In 1978 Guna took over the responsibiliti $\epsilon$ of Technical Services Librarian with overa responsibilities for Acquisitions, Serials, Binc ing, as well as Cataloguing. She served as Act ing Chief Librarian in 1981 and played a majo role in planning the implementation of the lit rary's entry into ABN when it was still in th pilot stage.

Guna was from Latvia and having experi enced the transition from one culture to an other (she arrived in Australia shortly afte World War II) she was sensitive to the prob lems of people newly arrived in this country She made valuable contributions to drama and music within the Latvian community and art music and theatre were lifelong interests fo her.

Guna was professionally active, serving or numerous committees for the Library Associ ation of Australia and helping to organise seminars and conferences within her areas o expertise

Her professional approach to her work and sensitivity towards her staff and library user earned the respect of her colleagues.

## SCHOLARSHIPS FOR WOMEN MANAGERS

The Australian Graduate School of Manage ment is offering up to four scholarships for women to take the School's Development Pro gram for Managers, which will be held from 14 September to 7 November 1986. Each scholar ship will be worth \$4,500 which covers half of the program fee. Organisations sponsoring women applicants will be responsible for the balance of the total fee of \$8,900 if their can didate is successful.

The DPM is an eight week fully residential program designed to increase the effectiveness of participants as managers whether ir the private or public sector. The program is particularly suitable for managers who have been successful as heads of a functional area or of a particular activity and expect to move, or have recently moved into a position with general management responsibilities. Typically in their thirties to mid-forties, these managers need to broaden their perspective and increase their knowledge and range of skills for the demands of very senior levels of responsibility. The program is designed for successful managers who are motivated to enhance their management performances.
