storytelling workshop for beginners — 'olktales for all ages' — was presented by enni Woodroffe of the Department of Inforation and Library Studies at WAIT on 4 arch 1986.

Numbers were limited to 20, and a very nthusiastic group of teacher-librarians, lirarians and students were introduced to the tricacies and mystiques of storytelling.

The full and comprehensive programme covered the many facets of the art, including techniques of telling a story, selection, preparation and presentation. Emphasis was placed on creating your own individual style — the one which suits you. Above all, said Jenni, storytellers must be happy with their story. They must be able to empathise with it.

Jenni shared her memories of a childhood rich with story reading and followed this with a South East Asian folktale, *The story spirits*, which had all the traditional ingredients of a successful folktale — spontaneity, mystery, fear, magic — leaving a lasting memory.

Linda Collins followed with a Papua New Guinea folktale, *The Story of the Papaya*. Linda has lived in Papua New Guinea and with a few visual effects created the right atmosphere for the story.

Doin' the Megadoc Jive

On 21 April Philips demonstrated their Megadoc high capacity, high speed electronic document handling system. It combines two new technologies — digital image conversion and digital optical recording — to efficiently store and retrieve large numbers of documents.

Megadoc uses a 30cm double-sided optical disc to store in digital form images read into it by a scanner. Images can include illustrations, handwriting and photos. These can be accessed by a pc onto a high resolution screen or a hard copy can be printed immediately.

Each disc can hold 2 Gigabytes of data and up to 64 discs with four disc drives can be mounted into a jukebox-like arrangement (to give access to around 8 million A4-size pages of information!).

Applications so far include information retrieval, mail handling and dossier managment. Megadoc is being used in Europe by press clipping services, banks, insurance companies and
