

Writer's Life


A fascinating collection which includes drawings, photographs, diaries, school reports and letters dating from 1915, has been donated to the State Library of NSW. These are the papers of novelist Eleanor Dark who died last year.

There are fifteen boxes in the collection which traces Eleanor Dark's life and development as a writer.

Eleanor Dark led a quietly radical family life as the daughter of Labor politician and writer, Howell O'Reilly, who introduced the first bill for women's suffrage in the NSW Legislative Assembly, and later the wife of socialist Dr Eric Dark, driven from Katoomba, NSW, as a communist sympathiser during World War II.

Eleanor Dark is probably best known for her trilogy *The Timeless Land* (1941) which told the story of white settlement in Australia. It was made into a successful television series for the ABC a few years ago.

After their marriage in 1922 Eleanor and Eric Dark moved to Katoomba, where she began her first novel *Slow Dawning*, published in London in 1932.



Apart from some time living in Queensland in the 1950s, Katoomba remained Eleanor Dark's home throughout her life. Her study 'Arana' is shown in the photograph.

She wrote ten novels in all, a number of short stories and poems, which she wrote under the pseudonym of Patricia O'Rane.

Eleanor Dark was a very private person, and this collection provides for the first time a glimpse into the life of this accomplished writer.
