FREEDOM OF INFORMATION

FOI INCREASED CHARGES DISALLOWED

Following the Government's disappointing decision in July to increase FOI charges, it was pleasing that the Senate moved on 13 November to disallow the new charges. Previously the Minister for Finance, Senator Walsh, had stated that the reason for the higher charges was to discourage FOI requests. This was clearly at variance with the Attorney-General's assurance that the Government's commitment to effective Freedom of Information remained unchanged.

The Library Association of Australia's opposition to the increased charges has been clearly and effectively expressed. Executive Director Jenny Adams wrote to the Sydney Morning Herald 26 October expressing the LAA's opposition to the increased charges and urging the use of public libraries as a cheap and convenient means of access to government information.

JACK WATERFORD HONOURED

Canberra journalist Jack Waterford has been awarded the Graham Perkin Award for the Australian Journalist of the Year.

The chairman of the judging panel, Sir Theodor Bray, said Jack Waterford, a journalist with the Canberra Times, had pioneered a new path in Australian journalism with his work on the Commonwealth Government's Freedom of Information Act. 'For ten years, he chronicled the development of the Act and the Commonwealth's administrative law package,' Sir Theodor said.

Mr Waterford warned that FOI legislation was under threat. 'At the moment, there are probably no more than two members of the Federal Cabinet who support the existing legislation and there are stirrings to cut back the Act to little more than a privacy Act, giving a right of access to one's personal files but no right to scrutinise the central processes of government,' he said. 'That battle may be lost unless members of the Press defend the rights which have been created and, by making greater use of the Act, entrench the rights which have been achieved.'

NEW SOUTH WALES

NSW seems no closer to the passage of FOI legislation, despite the promises of the Wran Government. An FOI Bill introduced in 1983 has lapsed, and the Government has given no indication of when a new bill may be introduced into State Parliament.

VICTORIA

The Cain Government has moved to strengthen exemptions from release under the State FOI Act. The Premier is particularly concerned that Cabinet documents will be released. Amendments introduced into Par liament will give the Premier the power to de cide which documents are Cabinet documents and therefore exempt from release. There wil be no external or judicial review of such decisions.
