The first Australian Online Information Conference and Exhibition, held at the Sydney Hilton on 20–22 January, was such an outstanding success that the organisers have taken the decision to follow it up with a second conference in January 1987. Twenty-seven exhibitors have already reserved space for the next conference.

Delegate numbers had to be cut off at 550, leaving 200 people disappointed. The delegates attended three days of papers and product reviews covering a very wide range of subjects relating to online information. Some of the recurring themes in the program were the impact of new technology (notably CD-ROMs) and the roles of end-users and information professionals. There were also sessions on electronic publishing and videotex, as well as critiques of online information services in various disciplines. A detailed review of the conference and summary of the papers is published in a special issue of the Australian Database Development Association Newsletter, no. 17 (January/February, 1986). The LAA will publish the conference proceedings as soon as possible.
