

## UNSW ILL CHARGES

The resources of the University of New South Wales library are seriously overstrained at present and, as a result, it is having difficulty in maintaining both its collection and its services to users. In 1985 the staff cost of subsidising loans from UNSW to other libraries amounted to about \$120,000. In order to try and redress this imbalance UNSW has decided to charge \$15.00 for both interlibrary loans and for copies of material.

Exempt from this document delivery fee, for a variety of reasons, are the following: all universities and CAEs, members of the Office of Library Cooperation, CSIRO Libraries, Australian Atomic Energy Commission Library, Australian Bureau of Statistics, Reserve Bank of Australia (Sydney), Law Courts Library

(Sydney), Ove Arup & Partners (North Sydney), Department of Health (Sydney), Department of Agriculture (Sydney), Royal Australasian College of Physicians (Sydney), and all Hospital Libraries. These libraries are also asked to direct their interlibrary loan and copying requests to another source except in those cases where UNSW holds the only copy in Australia.

For the \$15.00 fee UNSW undertakes to act on any request within two working days of the request's receipt. Rush service, including priority-paid mail or collection by the requesting library's courier, will cost an additional \$3.00. All payments may be made by cheque or by LAA vouchers.

The new scheme came into operation on 1 August 1986.

## Conferences Coming Up

### Publishing Congress

The first Annual Asian World Publishing Congress together with its supporting trade exhibition PUBCON Expo 87 takes place in Singapore during 23-27 February, 1987. This new Asian congress for advertising, newspaper, magazine and book publishing, has the support of the Singapore Trade Development Board and is being organised in affiliation with FOLIO magazine (USA).

Congress keynote speakers from the USA, Japan, Hong Kong, Australia, Asean countries and Europe will address delegates. Morning presentations will cover: launching new publications; breaking into Japan and China; better business management; improving advertising and sales techniques; and achieving greater productivity. The afternoons will provide delegates with a choice of 28 in-depth workshops. The main conference language will be English.

The trade exhibition, PUBCON Expo, offers marketing opportunities for companies seeking a larger share of the publishing market and is expected to attract over 4,000 trade visitors in addition to congress delegates.

*Sections* \$1.00 per head, twice a year, with minimum of \$150.00 per section.

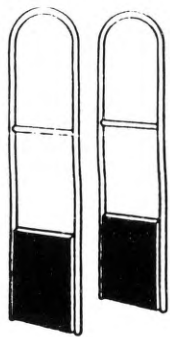
*Special grants* of \$100, twice a year, RARA On-line users and Western Regional Chapter.
