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BOOK REVIEW

The secondary school library: dukedom large enough?/by Patricia Smart. Wellington: New Zealand Council for Educational Research. 1985. 79 pp. ISBN 0 908567 40 5.

Doubts about the quality of school library collections, the adequacy of staffing, the effectiveness of skills instruction and the ability of teachers to utilise library facilities and services are familiar to Australian teacher librarians. It is gratifying that similar concerns have resulted in this very readable report by New Zealand librarian Patricia Smart on the use made of secondary school libraries in her

Smart's aim was to 'try to build up a picture of activities' in nine representative libraries in the Canterbury region, so that information would be available for any future investigation into the role of the school library and librarian. Data was obtained through observation and from responses to questionnaires administered to students who came to the library in class groups, at lunchtime or in study periods, and to teachers accompanying classes. Profiles of the libraries were then constructed.

The limited scale of the study and its preliminary nature are acknowledged by the author. This notwithstanding, it should be noted that we are told nothing about the teacher questionnaire (the student instrument, with an analysis of responses, is provided as Append 2) except that it 'sought information about th reasons for visiting the library and their view about some of its features'. More positively, the profiles and the recommendations offer th Australian reader the opportunity to thir critically about our own progress over rece years. While hoping that the course in Teach Librarianship at Wellington Teachers College signals the beginning of relief for the bele guered library assistants who have borne th brunt of New Zealand school library wor since 1960, we should resist the temptation feel complacent about Australian advances education for Teacher Librarianship, in impl menting the library resource centre conce and in developing an information skills curri ulum. It is clear from Smart's recommend tions that children will not gain maximu benefit from their library 'dukedom' unt trained teacher librarians are joined by teac ers who are themselves confident and comp tent library users and who are able encourage and assist their students in librar use. In this area, like the New Zealanders, v still have far to go.

This concise, practical and attractively pr sented monograph will be an asset in the li rary of any institution with a School of Librarianship or a School of Teacher Educ tion. It also has much to offer teacher librarians
