The appointment is a historyaking one as it is the first time a oman has received a permanent opointment as State Librarian.

Jane La Scala brings to the position more

an thirty years of experience as a librarian d library administrator. She has spent 17 ars in public libaries in positions ranging om junior library assistant to Chief Librian. She has been Acting State Librarian ice July 1985 when her predecessor, Warren orton, took up his appointment as Directoreneral of the National Library of Australia. Working with the Library Council of Vicria has given Jane La Scala the opportunity be involved in the planning and developent of public and government library serces on a state and national basis. She has en directly involved in the development of licies for public libraries in Victoria and has ovided consultancy and advice to improve eir efficiency and effectiveness. This has eant involvement in building planning ams, development of standards and evaluan methods as well as the promotion of raries and information services and their portance in community life.

In 1980 the State Government provided the nding for Jane La Scala to visit libraries in andinavia, Italy and England, where she idied local government restructure and its fect on libraries and their services to all mmunity groups. She has also had nine ars experience in Canadian libraries which is given her a valuable international backbound to bring to her assessments and ideas a library development in Australia.

She has always been involved in many divities in the library profession and has eved as representative with groups and mmittees dealing with many and varied beets of library interests. During the time has spent as Acting State Librarian she has briked with CAVAL, AACOBS and ALIC as all as the State Librarians Council and the ate Library/Museum Buildings Committee. 
## LOCAL GOVERNMENT RECORDS LOCAL HISTORY IN NSW

The Government Gazette of 5 July last carried a proclamation of great importance to everyone concerned with local government and local history in New South Wales. The ordinance which regulates the retention of municipal and shire records has been amended in the most decisive manner. From now on a large array of documents must be preserved; many others must at least be kept on microfilm.

Much of the credit must go to the Action Committee on Local Government Records, a widely representative group which has been given official status and backing by the Minister. Over four years, it has worked with the Department of local Government to achieve this end and to formulate guidelines for the operation of the system.

Education and preparation are the key to the new order. As a part of a continuing process, the Action Committee, the NSW Branch of the Library Association of Australia, held an evening seminar at the State Archives Office on 27 November. The seventy people who attended included local government personnel, local history librarians, archivists and historians, notably representatives of the new Professional Historians Association of NSW.

The launching of a new and largely revised edition of *Local Studies Collections* by John Flint and Anne Berry began proceedings, a heartening sign of the existence of an effective tool for local historians and custodians.



Thomas Keneally, one of Australia's leading authors was present at the launch of the Arts Documentation Service database (ARTS) at the Australia Council on December 18. Produced by the Australia Council and available on AUSINET, ARTS covers press clippings on arts personalities in Australia held by the Australian Council Library.
