LIBRARY PEACE PROJECTS

In earlier report on the International Year of Peace Resource Centre Grants said that some of the activities undertaken by participating ibraries would be reported in *InCite*. Many libraries have arranged display or poster exhibitions, competitions for readers of all ages ocusing on topics such as nuclear war, condict resolution and disarmament, storytelling and a host of outdoor activities, including tree plantings, peace walks and kite flying.

Here are a few of the special activities ar-

anged for IYP —

Altona City Library Service held a teddy bear display — to symbolise childhood, love and peace — and a balloon launch, with each balloon carrying a peace message. City Librarian David Ferguson reports that the activities attracted many children, and brought some parents to the library for the first time.



Waverley Municipal Library in Bondi Junction is well known for its cultural programs. For IYP a recital of music and poetry was presented by the St. Philips Players, and featured works by Britten, Purcell, Telemann and Vaughan Williams, and music by the folk group Flyte.

Glenelg Regional Library Service at Hamilton in Victoria began a 'hands across the ocean for peace' project, which linked the service with the Public Library in Hamilton, Scotland. Members of the 'Friends of Hamilton Library (Vic)' visited their sister service, taking a copy of the city's official history and a resource kit.

Many librarians have suggested books, periodicals, films and videos on peace related issues that have been popular with library users, and which supplement the resources in the two lists prepared by the IYP Secretariat. The Australian Nuclear Free Zones Secretariat has also produced a useful list — Resources on Peace Issues for Libraries.

One title that may not have come to your notice yet is Alternative to War: Conflict resolution and the peaceful settlement of disputes by Dr. Keith Suter, Foundation Director of the Trinity Peace Research Institute and a recipient of one of the Federal Government's Peace Awards.
