As a result of a conference organised by the Education for Librarianship Section of the Library Association of Australia, in late 1984 information professionals gathered together in Melbourne to share ideas.

The keynote address by Dr. Anthony Debons, Professor of Information Science, University of Pittsburgh, should be of particular interest to all those working in the information sector.

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YOUNG WRITERS' PROJECT

The Australian Young Writers' Project wa inaugurated in May 1985 as a contribution t the International Youth Year. It was designe to encourage the creative potential in your writers throughout the country, and ove 5,000 entries were received.

The project aimed at gaining a cross-section of writings reflecting young people's interest and their responses to the world around then Half the entries were poems; the other ha was made up of stories, plays, radio scrip and dialogues.

The organisers found that the future is strong pre-occupation among the younge writers. In the higher age group themes cov ered the most urgent concerns of moder society: unemployment, nuclear war, drug death and the sense of individual futility, a well as personal relationships and socia interchange.

As one assessment panel put it:

. . . a staggering range of material . . . wha comes through most strongly though is a revitality: even where the viewpoint is at it most pessimistic there is still an underlyin sense of humour and optimism retained. Th language is often raw and violent: the fru tration and anger of a disillusioned genera tion comes through strongly ... a extremely exciting project.'

Penguin Books Australia will produce an ar thology of works submitted. ABC Radio adapting stories and will broadcast poems etc., in a series of 10 national programs durin 1986. ABC Television has scheduled five ha hour dramas for production in March 1986.

The Literature Board in conjunction wit the Australian Film & Television School wi offer a scholarship to a selected entrant for 3 months scriptwriting course.

The Australian newspaper has already pul lished a selection of entries in their quarterl Literary Supplement; other outlets for th work will be actively sought by the commitee, and will include national literary maga zines, school publications and theatr companies. Successful authors will be cor tacted directly by the organisations proposin to use their work in keeping with the cond tions of entry.

The English journal The Fiction Magazin has commissioned an article on the project because of its stimulus for young writers an as an example of its kind.

All the organising committee members wer strongly impressed at the number of entries the energy and honesty and the urgency of s much writing by young Australians toda; Committee members were: Patricia Adam Penguin Books Australia Ltd; Tom Shapcot Director, Literature Board, Australia Counci Chris Farrell, ABC TV; Allan Kendall, AB Radio; Tony Wiseheart, IYY Secretariat.
