

Children's Library Services In Tasmania

Are Tasmanian children being short-changed in the area of library services? The Tasmanian Branch of the Library Association of Australia held a meeting on Wednesday, 8 April to debate this question. A panel of three speakers addressed the well-attended meeting.

Panel members were Ms Lyn Calitz and Mr Ray Bartle of the State Library of Tasmania, and Mr John Levett, Head of the School of Librarianship at the University of Tasmania. Included in the audience were Mr Val Smith, Chairman of the Tasmanian Library Advisory Board and Mr Warwick Dunstan, State Librarian.

Mr Ray Bartle, Derwent Regional Librarian, opened the discussion with a brief outline of the present state of children's services in the State Library system. This was followed by an assessment of the findings of the recently published Trask Report on children's library services in Tasmania.

Mrs Lyn Calitz, from Hobart's children's library, gave a first-hand account of the difficulties facing librarians involved in the provision of children's services in the State Library system

brary system.

She pointed to the fact that there is no structure for children's services and there are no designated children's librarians positions.

This has resulted in a lack of any specialist expertise being built up. She saw the need for the appointment of a children's library services co-ordinator as vital.

The final panelist, Mr John Levett, provided a point of view from someone vitally concerned through his responsibility for the education of the State's future librarians.

Following the presentation by panel members, the meeting was opened for discussion and comment. There were a wide variety of responses to the findings and recommendations of the Trask Report. It was accepted that staffing and resources were key elements in any future planning. There is a need for 'catch-up' funding to restore children's services to an acceptable level. Various strategies for obtaining such funding were discussed.

Mr Val Smith stressed the need for the State Library to liaise with school libraries to ensure that scarce resources were spent in the most effective way. School libraries were seen as being an important resource, but limited by their restricted opening hours.

The meeting concluded with a resolution to write to the Tasmanian Minister for Education and the Arts, seeking his support in the area of improving the provision of children's services as outlined in the Trask Report.

Welcome to new members

On 25 March the Tasmanian Branch held its annual Welcome to New Members Dinner at the University Club. Over 40 people attended and six new members were signed up on the night, largely due to the energetic efforts of Branch President, Jill Adamski. Those people who joined on the night were eligible for the New Members Prize, a bottle of champagne. The lucky winner was Ingrid McKenzie, Library Officer at the Commonwealth Joint Law Courts Library. Karen Wilson of the Education Department won the door prize for members, a LAA Diary.

The speaker for the night was Ross Gibbs of Carringbush Library in Victoria and his subject was 'Lobbying and the LAA'. Ross delivered a thought provoking speech, outlining the strategies behind the various lobbying campaigns with which the LAA has been associated in the past few years. Included in his presentation were some video clips of Victorian librarians involved in the SOLV campaign. The blockading bookmobiles were certainly

an impressive sight as they rolled up to Parliament House in Melbourne, making their presence well and truly felt.

The evening closed with a lively question session. Ross gave more details about the expansion of library activities at Carringbush and elsewhere. The idea of using libraries as sales outlets for AGPS publications provoked some soul-searching discussion on the role and objectives of libraries. While the conditions under which libraries operate in Victoria are quite different in many ways from those in Tasmania, there was general agreement that there were lessons for Tasmania to learn in looking at the Victorian experience.

SCHOOL LIBRARIES SECTION NSW GROUP

Annual General Meeting

A goodly array of our membership gathered in the Blaxland Gallery Auditorium for the Annual General Meeting of the School Libraries Section (NSW Group) on 18 February. The executive for 1987 comprises Christine Hingerty, President; Mary Jane Stannus, Past President; Merran Dawson, Vice President; Sheila Hawkins, Secretary; and Alison Glassock, Treasurer. They are supported by 25 Committee Members, five of whom are new.

Mary Jane gave an interesting and impressive account of the Section's activities and achievements in 1986. The three main

thrusts of the Section during this year were in the areas of lobbying and communication, professional development and publications. Later, Gary Johnston, Inspector (English/History) from Strathfield Education Centre, launched the Section's latest publication, Supporting the curriculum: policies, perspectives and programs, the fruit of one of the Section's highly successful seminars last year.

Rounding off the evening, the gallery's curator, Margaret Meagher, outlined the gallery's policy and spoke about several recent exhibitions including one from the Holmes à Court collection and the successful exhibition of the works of E. H. Shepard together with Ginger Meggs illustrations and realia.

She also gave details of a display of early Australian colonial art from the Mitchell and Dixson collections of the State Library which the gallery mounted last year, and provided most interesting background information on the current exhibition of Banks' Florilegium, engravings depicting flora collected by Sir Joseph Banks on Cook's first voyage to Australia. Mrs Meagher mentioned that the Gallery tries to mount at least one exhibition each year of particular interest to children and stressed that gallery staff are happy to cooperate in any educational ventures.

New publications

The School Libraries Section (NSW Group) has over recent months pursued its active seminar and publication programs as evidenced in the appearance of two new publications.

Children's literature for multicultural Australia by Judy Crewe originated as part of her work towards a Master of Arts in Migration Studies at Macquarie University. The School Libraries Section decided to publish a major portion of the work which Judy substantially revised and updated as it deals with an area where little published material is available. Judy's approach has been to examine over 50 Australian children's literature items most of which have been published in the last 15 years, exploring particularly the presentation in them of themes such as conflict, cultural differences, alienation, loneliness, homesickness, and acceptance and rejection.

Judy's work is the first in a series of occasional papers 'Issues in information services to young people'. The series aims to provide a forum for the publication of a variety of top-

ics of wide interest from a range of writers, researchers and practitioners. The Section is aiming to publish a number of items in the series each year. Supporting the curriculum: policies, perspectives and programs brings together papers originally presented at the School Libraries Section seminar of the same title held in 1986. The seminar's aim was to examine the policies, educational perspectives and specific programs which affect the broad curriculum within schools. Particular emphasis was given to the role of the teacher-librarian in these areas. The publication is a significant achievement as it gathers together information vital to effect curriculum implementation by teacher-librarians in New South Wales schools.

Sylvia's talk focused on a number of points: conducting an information needs analysis, constant monitoring of services provided, personal presentation and the need to develop the ability to respond to changing information needs. The details of the service she provides at Stoy Hayward gave a fascinating insight into how the library and information service could become a pivotal part of the organisation, in close contact with top management, and ever ready to think of new services which the library could provide.

Report of the Board of Education

ouncil endorsed a recommendation of the Board of Education that the Graduate Dipoma in School Librarianship from the School of Information Studies, Riverina-Murray Institute of Higher Education be recognised by the Association. The recognition is for a period of five years to 31 December 1991 which will allow a reassessment of the course to coincide with the Institute's other course reviews.

Council elected Janette Wright to the Board for a further term to 30 April 1990.

Formation of Divisions

Council approved the formation of the LAA Conservation of Library Materials Special Interest Group. The request came from the participants of a seminar on the conservation of library materials held at Sydney University and organised by the UCLS.

Election Returns

The low return in national LAA elections has been of concern to Council for some time as it has rarely been greater than 10% of membership. Council has established a subcommittee, convened by the Queensland Councillor, Barbara Paton, to look at ways in which the rate might be improved. The use of Freepost and the cost implications will be considered. The sub-committee will report back to the September meeting.

Commonwealth Library Accommodation Guidelines

The Special Libraries Section (ACT Group) has prepared Commonwealth Library Accommodation Guidelines because the present Commonwealth Office Accommodation Guidelines provided little guidance to staff in planning library accommodation. Council has endorsed the guidelines and is urging the National Office Accommodation Consultative Committee to adopt them.


Branch Executive
