scholarship. This award is yet another in a long list of distinctions accorded one of our most illustrious professional colleagues. We honour him and offer our warmest congratulations on this further recognition of his distinguished career.

Congratulations are also offered to Miss Edna Haynes, 77, of Burwood, Victoria who was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia, (OAM) for service to the community, particularly as a librarian, in the recent Queen's Birthday Honours. Miss Haynes joined the Prahran Library in 1940 and graduated in 1953 to the position of Prahran City Librarian which she held until 1975.

Still on the question of honours, please note in your diary that the presentations of our own prestigious H.C.L. Anderson awards to Professor Jean Whyte and former President Jim Dwyer will be made at the Association's Annual General Meeting in Canberra on the afternoon of Wednesday 2 September, (ie immediately preceding the 50th Anniversary celebrations).

Last year, as Vice-President, I had the opportunity of contributing to several issues of the President's column. This opportunity is being extended, likewise, to this year's Vice-President, Alan Bundy, who will be your columnist for the next two issues.


Anne Harrison Award Closing date extended!
