

NSW BRANCH

The second all-day meeting for 1987 was held at LAA House on 18 July. Two Saturday Branch Council meetings are held each year so that regional councillors have the opportunity to attend. Three regional councillors, Alison Reid (Far West), John Shipp (South Coast) and Dennis Warren (Riverina) were able to be present. The following are highlights from the day's agenda.

Conservation on the move

This was a unique opportunity for councillors to hear Helen Price, LAA conservator, describe the project and its achievements. One of Helen's concerns is to ensure that sufficient groundwork is done to enable a continuation of the type of work the project is doing once the Bicentennial grant has expired. Helen brought a sample of the notes she uses in her conservation workshops which illustrate the techniques she teaches. Branch hopes to bring these together as a publication early in 1988.

Information exchange

Time was set aside for regional councillors to report on activities in their areas. Dennis Warren reported that Riverina region had been preoccupied with planning the 'Libraries Alone' conference which attracted 150 delegates from Australia and New Zealand. Alison Reid reported on the Far West's efforts to promote libraries in Broken Hill and the Group's work in attracting people to the region as speakers. Janet Robinson, Branch President, recently spoke to the group, and Barbara Anderson, Helen Price, and the children's author, Simon French, have been invited to visit in the near future. John Shipp spoke of Wollongong's seminar program and the city library's move to new premises.

Program support

Joanne Fuller described her role as Programme Support Manager as the first contact point for division and section office bearers. Regional representatives were interested in her intention to shortly produce a compilation of information on teleconferencing.

Membership

Time was spent considering how to promote the LAA with a view to attracting new members. It was stressed to regional and sectional representatives that they should urge their current members to take out membership of these groups in 1988, especially in the light of the way funding of sections and divisions is proposed for next year. Failure to maintain members may result in diminished funding for a section.

Call for nominations

Nominations are called for the following national positions in the Cataloguers Section:

Each financial member of the Cataloguers Section is eligible to nominate for one of the above positions. The positions of National President, National Secretary and National Treasurer will be filled for a two-year term com-



mencing 1 January 1988. These three positions together with the Editor of *Cataloguing Austra lia*, form the National Executive of th Cataloguers Section. The National Executiv fosters the exchange of information amongs state groups of the Section, monitors the Sec tion's journal, *Cataloguing Australia*, cc ordinates the input of state groups into th planning of the National Cataloguing Confei ence, and speaks for the Section when require in a national context.

The position of one of the three LAA represer tatives on the Australian Committee of Cataloguing (ACOC) will be filled for a three year term commencing 1 January 1988. ACO(is a tripartite committee of the LAA, AACOB and the National Library. It is the principa Australian forum for the discussion of descrip tive cataloguing, subject cataloguing and clas sification matters. It is a joint author of th Anglo-American Cataloguing Rules, and rou tinely meets to discuss proposed AACR2 rul revisions, and briefs the Australian representa tive on the Joint Steering Committee fo AACR.

Nominations for any of the above position should be made in writing and addressed to th National Secretary, Ruthi Urbach, C/- ASCIS 325 Camberwell Rd, Camberwell, VIC, 3124 The nomination should state the nominee' name, address and LAA membership number There is no need for a seconder. The nomination should be accompanied by a brief statemen outlining the nominee's background. Nomina tions for all of the above positions should react the National Secretary by 30 September 1987 An election by all financial members of the Section will be held by postal ballot in October

LIBRARY TECHNICIANS SECTION SA GROUP

Commencing with Orientation Week in Febru ary for new and continuing students, member of the Section explained the functions and benefits of the LAA and encouraged students to join the Association. Planning is well in-hand for technician: attending the Fourth National Conference o Library Technicians in Melbourne. A small bu dedicated group are organising a workshop to be held during the SA Branch Annual Country Conference in Mt Gambier, 16-17 October Technicians and students in the area have shown a keen interest.

VICTORIAN BRANCH

Professor Bernard Vavrek, Director of the Center for the Study of Rural Librarianship, Clarion State University, Pennsylvania, ddressed a gathering of about 25 members on 25 July. Prof Vavrek spoke about libraries and ibrary services in rural America, and he painted a very different picture to the one we usually hear from the United States.

His Center divides rural libraries into two roups according to the size of the community hey serve, those serving less than 25,000 eople and those serving less than 2,500. The ommunities themselves fund the libraries and here is virtually no Federal funding available. Average salaries are US\$10,000 and 87 percent f the staff have no library qualifications. Average total budget is around US\$22,000 and hat includes salaries. Prof Vavrek's Center onducts courses for those in charge of these mall rural libraries, and he treated his udience to an aspect of US librarianship which eems to be completely unknown in this ountry.

3ranch Council

The SOLV campaign seems to have had its ffect on the State Government's budget allocaions for 1987/88. Public libraries have been llocated \$17.146 million instead of the threatned \$15.6 million, but this is still less than the revious sum of \$17.6 million. However the espite may be temporary as the 'extra' llowance is stated to be a once only supplenent to the base figure. It seems that the battle or funding will continue.

The second Geddes report, entitled 'Discusion paper on improving services and delivery n publicly funded libraries in Victoria', has een released and it appears to have implicaions for all types of libraries in this state. A Branch delegation will speak to the Minister bout the implications of the report in nid-August.

Branch Council has been concerned about epresentation of the Branch on other bodies, nd a study of past requests and minutes has hown that there are just four official represenatives. They are as follows: Library Council of ictoria: Ross Gibbs; National Book Council: largaret Smith; RMIT Information Services course Committee: Ross Gibbs; SOLV: Rod

Blacker.

Other representatives are not officially sanctioned by the Branch. Branch Council has decided that there will be a spill of all these positions and that new nominations will be made on a calendar year basis where possible. Branch Council would also like to make non-official representatives into official reps!

LAA CATALOGUERS SECTION, **QLD GROUP**

The second activity for 1987 was held at the Queensland Institute of Technology on 24 June. Judith Baskin from ABN spoke on ABN and the future of the National Union Catalogues.' About 45 people attended, including special and reference librarians as well as cataloguers.

Judith gave some interesting statistics on the number of records contributed to ABN by participants, including holdings added by dialup members, and by the addition of serials holdings, large retrospective conversion projects and braille and talking books holdings to NUCHP.

Discussion of future developments included downline loading and ABN on CD-ROM.

For our third activity, we took advantage of the visit of Mary Pietris to Brisbane after the Cataloguers Conference in Townsville. On 21 July, there was standing room only as Mary addressed our meeting at the State Library's premises at Teneriffe, on recent developments in LCSH. Mary distributed a comprehensive handout on the structure of the Library of Congress Subject Cataloguing Division and the way in which subject headings are assigned, giving all who attended a better understandworkings of this ing of the august organisation.

Our most recent activity was a combined one with UCLS, Queensland Section, at the University of Queensland on 6 August for a panel discussion on the topic, 'Cataloguing enrichment – destiny or delusion?' About 40 people enjoyed the contributions of Tom Cochrane (QIT), George Eichinski (Uni. of Qld, whose paper was read by Gaynor Austin of BCAE),

and Jenny Kenyon (Parliamentary Library of Queensland), who spoke on PARLAIRS. The reference librarian's viewpoint in favour of catalogue enrichment was argued passionately by Margaret Travis of BCAE, and the cataloguing librarian's viewpoint against, was presented with equal fervour by Ian Simons from QIT.

We are also planning a workshop on the practice of assigning subdivisions in LCSH, to be held at BCAE on 6 October. It's starting to look like The Year of the Subject Heading for Queensland cataloguers, so we should all be experts on the topic by the end of the year.

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Directory of Australian Directories

Ralph Reid, 'directory gazer' looks at some of the directories reviewed for the LAA's Directory of Australian Directories.

The process of directory compilation is generally a thankless one, and always vexatious. If it was supported by unlimited resources of time, oney and expertise then conceivably all directories would be minor masterpieces; but it isn't, and they aren't. Most directories meet their ajor objective of information provision and, given the widely different circumstances and conditions under which they are put together, there is then doubtful validity in comparing directories (even those that address the same subject areas) and using terms like 'better' or best'.

So, with this in mind, I would like to briefly mention some of the 500 or so directories which reviewed and described during compilation of data for the first edition of the *Directory of Australian Directories*, those which had some characteristics that caught my fancy. A second short article will concentrate on several library directories; this first one will deal with some more general ones.

Firstly, the Australian Agricultural Year Book, published for the National Farmers' Federation and edited by Julian Cribb. Surely one of the most attractive and informative of publications; lavishly illustrated and presented, it contains not only directory data but is also a nine of information on all aspects of agriculcure, livestock, cropping and fishing industries. Maps, statistics on all aspects of production and trade, numerous in-depth articles on a variety of acets of primary industry. More than a mere irectory; it is potentially a valuable teaching resource as well.

Also looking at rural topics is the *Australian* Small Farms Handbook, compiled by Mark

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LIBRARY TECHNICIANS SECTION NSW GROUP

Three of our committee members attended the one-day seminar in Armidale on 29 June entiled 'Para-professionals in libraries'. This was organised by the New England Regional Group of the LAA and was made possible through the upport of NSW Branch Council.

Guest speaker Beverley Runcie, Acting Head, School of Library Studies Sydney College f TAFE, gave a very comprehensive outline of he Library Practice Associate Diploma Course. Linda Sercombe, Assistant Library Cechnician at Armidale CAE and Lexie Zantiois, Senior Library Technician, State Library of VSW spoke on aspects of working and studying as a library technician. Ted Flowers, Univerity Librarian, University of Newcastle spoke n the para-professional in the library, applyng this particularly to library technicians working in university libraries.

A very real feeling of isolation, particularly in e area of education and training, was made pparent by technicians in country centres. At e moment six para-professionals who are mpleting the only external course available o them, through South Australian TAFE, are mployed at Armidale CAE and university ibraries. Arrangements with SA and NSW AFE have accommodated these students for lock release in required subjects. However this Pearson and published by Second Back Row Press. It deals with services, supplies, equipment and information sources for the small farmer and is organised in subject sections for organisations, a services and equipment catalogue, books and journals, special libraries, training, and a calendar of major events. In short, a most thorough, informative and attractive resource.

All of the Horan Wall and Walker guides represent excellent value for money in a diversity of fields. The *Cheap Eats* and *Bargain Shopper's Guide* series for each of the major capital cities are typical of the range; consumer-oriented, cheap, widely available, and a refreshingly simple interpretation of how information can be packaged and marketed.

Education directories proliferate, and despite some inevitable duplication are generally well organised and worthwhile. One with a slightly different orientation and an imaginative presentation is *What's Where and What's About*, from Aquarius Promotions. It lists organisations which supply educational resource material, and venues for camps and excursions in the ACT, NSW and Victoria.

The single biggest subject field for directories is that of community information, and these directories come in all shapes and sizes. Of them, three are worthy of mention. The Thebarton (South Australia) community information calendar is a novel break away from the normal A4/A5 booklet format, as is the nifty little purse/pocket-sized *Information '86* produced by the Bankstown (NSW) City Library.

But for a community directory which best illustrates all the proper design and presentation techniques, look no further than the November 1985 edition of *Community Directory: City of Melbourne*, produced by the Melbourne City Council Libraries and Community Information Branch. This particular edition, designed by Mark Carter, can probably not be faulted for content and certainly not for presentation.

LAA Study Grant Award deadline extended till 1 December

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The Library Association of Australia will make funds available each year to support practising librarians wishing to undertake a study project. The number of awards in any year will depend upon the funds available and the estimated costs of proposals received.

The Association's intention in offering study grants is to provide an opportunity for librarians to undertake projects they would otherwise be unable to do because of the time and costs involved.

Conditions

- Available to a practising librarian in a supervisory or middle management position, with a minimum of three years' experience in library and information work.
- For the purpose of undertaking a study program on a selected library/information issue or problem of present and future relevance to the development and improvement of library and information services in Australia.
- The study may include opportunity for preliminary work, local or overseas visits/ consultations, attachment to another organisation, preparation of a publication, further educational qualification.
- The study is to culminate in a written report in two parts, provided to the Association. The first is a chronological summary of the project components together with a statement of the value derived, provided within one month of the project's culmination. The second component is a comprehensive report provided within four months of the project's culmination.
- It is expected that the study project will provide an opportunity for self development as well as benefit to the successful applicant's institution and present position.
- The award is not intended to be used to fund research projects.
- Applicants should complete an application form which gives:
 - A brief description of the study project, including aims; benefits to the individual and to the institution; possible outcomes of a project.
 - Identification and reasons for choice of particular institutions, persons or activities.
 Itinerary, timetable, travel/accom-
 - modation costs involved.
 - Details of any other funds or facilities being provided for the study project.
 - A curriculum vitae.
 2 reference' reports
- 2 referees' reports.
 Applicants must be financial members of the LAA.
