

riginally NT Branch planned to celebrate the AA 50th Anniversary by flying interested brary people to Borroolla and to participate in 12 official opening of the new Borroolla public brary.

Unfortunately our various fund-raising ctivities failed to provide the necessary nances. Thus a cheap alternative was sugested — a 'Borroolla on a Budget' dinner.

This dinner was held at The Lee Regency Resurant on 3 September. Twenty-five people njoyed a sumptuous meal and a fascinating alk from Mr Ted Evans, a former patrol officer 7 ith the Welfare Branch of the Department of 12 Northern Territory.

Ted was able to set many of the rumours bout the Carnegie Library at Borroolla to rest. le has first-hand knowledge of what hapened to the Borroolla library as he was the erson who had the dubious honour of closing . Ted was instructed to close the library and estroy all books — unless of great literary alue or of some significance to the Northern erritory.



Only one book met this criteria — Von Iueller's *Flora of the Northern Territory*. The vhereabouts of this book is unknown now.

Additionally Ted brought back two other looks for his own sentimental reasons and he rought these two books to the dinner. These low reside at the NT Museum.

Of the original collection, some 1,000 to ,500 books, only 200 remained when Ted was ent to close the library. Of these only 50 were

in a solid state — the rest crumbled into dust when touched. White ants, cockroaches, mildew and appalling storage conditions had taken their toll on this once valuable collection. This is not surprising when one realises that 'the library' was in a disused cell of the Borroolla police station.

Ted provided a fascinating insight into one of the most well-known Territory libraries and rounded off a most enjoyable and successful evening.

Mrs Theo Sharpels, who was Treasurer of the Branch in the mid 1940s spoke about the activities of the Association during that time. Membership was very small and for most librarians the role of the Library Association was seen as the means whereby they obtained their qualifications.

Mrs Mary Thompson gave an amusing account of life in the Cataloguing Section of the State Library of Tasmania in the 1940s. In particular she remembered the LAA registration papers which required trainee librarians to know important details such as 'what is the meaning of the word colophon'.

All those who attended thoroughly enjoyed the occasion and said 'let's do it again next year'


Sixty-six former members and friends joined with the Queensland Branch to celebrate LAA:50 with a three course dinner at the Special Functions Room of Brisbane CAE, Kelvin Grove Campus, on 15 September. The festive wine and champagne flowed freely and the enjoyment of the evening may be attested to by a number of sore heads the next morning. At times the din was deafening, as old friends met for the first time in many years over pre-dinner drinks.

Branch Vice-President Phil Roberts had 'sleuthed out' many former members and these special invitees were presented with LAA stick pins to commemorate the evening by special guest speaker, Harrison Bryan. Branch President Gaynor Austen proposed the toast to 'the next 50 years' while long serving member Mrs Hazel Jones cut the cake, with the assistance of Gaynor and Harrison.

Several early members shared their memories. Phyllis Courtice, who joined the University of Queensland in 1935, recalled her training in Canberra on a Carnegie Scholarship in 1937 and the handwriting lessons that all library staff were given for entering into the accessions register. Corinna Mowatt described her courage in forcing her one borrower at the Main Roads Department Library to register his loans, and her experience with the early examination system, when success in a subject made you automatically the next year's teacher. Spencer Routh recalled early days at the University of Queensland when librarianship included crawling up ladders, bucket of cement in hand, to fix a leaking roof. He also remembered the great bookloading race which took place between Harrison Bryan and Barry Scott during a stock relocation.

After dinner Harrison Bryan shared a fascinating tale of his period in Queensland libraries and of the development of the Queensland Branch of the LAA from 1949 through to his desertion south in 1963. The great support of prominent local academics was a feature, as were the yearly Christmas parties of enormous size and enjoyment. Concerns of the Branch then seem little different from those still facing the LAA today. He closed with a hearty rendition 'An LAA Jubilation' with the assistance of wife Florence, and the whole gathering joining in the refrain:




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
