## Appeal for PNG library

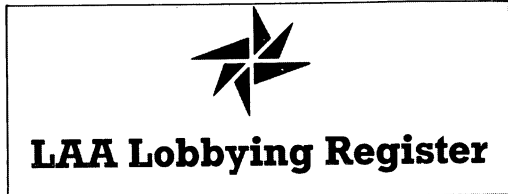
A pre-dawn fire on Saturday 13 December 1986 destroyed the facilities shared by the Ela Beach Public Library and the RSL Club. The origin and cause of the fire are unknown. The Ela Beach Public Library was the largest and oldest public library in Papua New Guinea. Over 15,000 books, magazines, catalogue records, furniture and equipment (collected over a period of 40 years) were completely burned within a matter of hours.

In 1946 the post-World War II administration opened the Ela Beach Public Library in the annex of the wartime officers' club on Ela Beach. Library services in Port Moresby had previously been maintained by private subscription, with the collection housed in the Library Institute building.

The location of the library was especially well-suited to the growing Port Moresby residential community at the time, and over the years has remained convenient and accessible to users of all ages and backgrounds.

An appeal is being made for the library to raise funds for replacement books. The goal is K200,000. Donations are needed quickly to ensure bookstock for the new library which is scheduled to open later this year.

The Association has been successful with many of its lobbying campaigns but there are always ways in which we can improve, and it is certain that there will be increasing numbers of issues to lobby about in the future

One way is to put more effort into forward planning to ensure that we are ready to instigate or respond to issues at short notice. To achieve this we are asking for your cooperation.

The Association intends to build up a lobbying register of members who have some political influence. This might include being on first name terms with a politician, being a Friends of the Library Group, or knowing just who are the influential public servants. (It is easy to think that knowing politicians is enough but if you've watched the TV series 'Yes Minister' you'll argue who really makes the decisions).

If you fit into one of the above categories, or think you can help in other ways, we want to hear from you. But don't contact us unless you are willing to be active because when we need your contact we'll expect you to do some of the work.

Lobbying is most successful when it comes from a large number of people spread across a wide geographical area and when it hits the politician on his home territory. You can't leave it to a small group any more. We are all in this together.

If you want to help the profession in its future lobbying campaigns and are willing to play an active role and have your contacts used, please contact me as soon as possible.

We are trying this idea at the suggestion of the Royal Australian Institute of Architects who ran a similar exercise. Naturally, any information you provide will be treated as confidential and will not be given to others before consulting you.
