### A basinful of the Pacific

Quarterly jottings from the New Hebrides was a remarkable survivor. First published in July 1893, its original purpose was to 'spread interest in Britain in the work of the New Hebrides Mission'. Because of its long life - its last known issue appeared in 1966 - Quarterly Jottings represents a significant source of historical information on Vanuatu. The Pacific Manuscripts Bureau microfilmed this publication or as many issues as could then be mustered some time ago. The Bureau has now published a very full index to this title, arranged by personal name, island and subject. An index to Quarterly jottings from the New Hebrides, 1893-1966 (Nos 1-284), edited by Robert Langdon, was published by the Pacific Manuscripts Bureau in 1988.

Another substantial tool for the Pacific researcher, from the same editor and publisher, is *The PMB book of Pacific indexes*. This sturdily-bound volume contains six indexes, three of

which have not been previously published (the others appeared in *Pambu* some years ago). These indexes unlock a tremendous range of neglected sources, such as *Annales hydrographiques* one of the indexes covers items on Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific which appeared in that publication between 1848 and 1968.

Semantics: a bibliography 1979–1985 by W. Terrence Gordon is a continuation of his 1980 publication which covered this subject for the 1965–1978 period. Materials covered are in English, French, German, Italian, Spanish and Portuguese, and are occassionally annotated ('Evidencethat adversative get–passive constructions are more flexible semantically than beneficial get–passive constructions' — I hope that's quite clear). The public library: its origins, purpose and significance, by W. J. Murison is now in its third edition, and provides a good overview of public library developments, with an emphasis on the British Isles. Sometimes the prose is rather ponderous and circumlocutory ('another faculty librarians must possess is to appraise the quality and suitability for the library of candidates presenting themselves as applicants for membership of their staff' means librarians must be able to select good staff, I think. Priceless pictures is a selection of quirky, eloquent and often poignant photographs from the NSW Government Printing Office. Picture the poor editor, Leigh Raymond, being forced to select 110 photographs from the collection of 200 000 negatives and 10,000 prints. Picnics in the snow, swagmen, an 1890 pillar box, rural life, primitive dentistry, prickly pear — an eminently browsable collection, beautifully designed by Patrick Coyle.
