### The other Expo

The Victorian Public Library Expo, held on 15 October as part of Library Week proved to be an interesting and successful day for all those involved.

The Expo held at City Square, Melbourne was organised by the Victorian public libraries in order to promote their services. The program included a poster competition and a library technology display. Jane La Scala launched *A Step by Step Guide to tracing your family history*. And, the Minister for Science, Mr Barry Jones, launched the Library Logo adopted by the Australian Library Promotion Council and the LAA, for use throughout Australia.

The program finale included a bush band performance and free Jolly Jumbuck mobiles for the younger audience.

### Multicultural database

An important new database devoted to multicultural issues will be launched in November by the Office of Multicultural Affairs, Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet. The Multicultural Australia Information System (MAIS) will provide summaries and references to over 7,000 reports, journals, articles, books, conference papers and government documents on multicultural and ethnic affairs.

The database will be available through the

OZLINE network of the National Library of Australia. The national network can be accessed by individuals or organisations using personal computers or through one of the 300 libraries and institutions linked to OZLINE.

### The Noma Award

*Working Life. Factories, Townships, and Popular Culture on the Rand, 1886-1940*, by Luli Callinicos has been named winner of the annual Noma Award for Publishing in Africa.

Established in 1979, the Noma Award is open to African writers whose work is published in Africa. The Award's founder, the late Koichi Noma, devoted his life to making books more readily available to developing countries.

The \$3,000 prize will be presented to the author on the opening of the 13th Ife Book Fair, to be held in Ile-Ife, Nigeria, on 17-20 January 1989.

Kiwinet, the first New Zealand online database hosting service specialising in information about New Zealand was recently launched by New Zealand's Deputy Prime Minister.

Kiwinet operates from the National Library of New Zealand's computer system and provides information on all aspects of New Zealand, including business, commerce, law, arts, humanities and the social sciences. It also comprises legislative databases, and data relating to legislation in the New Zealand Parliament, Parliamentary Questions, Hansard and judgements of the Court of Appeal.

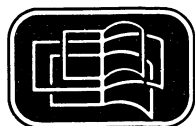
