# A close liaison

The Victorian Ministry for the Arts has set up a Library Services Unit to support and implement government policies in library and information services throughout Victoria.

The unit will provide administrative back-up to the Libraries Board of Victoria, as well as managing financial assistance programs to municipal public libraries. The unit will also assist with the introduction of accountability procedures and performance measures in public libraries.

Close liaison has been established between this unit and the LAA Victorian Branch to ensure effective communication and consultation on specific matters.
