Lobbying lost

Why is it that NSW members have little interest in lobbying? Only twelve members registered for John Levett's 'Lobby or Lose' seminar when it was offered for a second time recently.

The seminar was organised by the NSW Branch at the suggestion of ALIA's Head Office and was first scheduled for November last year. Six members registered then. Reasons put forward for such a poor response included inappropriate timing of the seminar and the fact that most libraries had spent their staff development budget by that time, especially since LAA/IFLA was a 1988 highlight.

As a result, the seminar was rescheduled for 17 March 1989. Flyers were inserted into all *InCites* for NSW and ACT members. The seminar was also highlighted in Events. Announcements were placed on electronic bulletin boards using Ilanet and the CLANN system. Again the response was disappointing—only twelve registrations by 13 March. I decided to cancel the seminar as a minimum of twenty-five people were needed.

Later in the week I was present at the AGM of the NSW Branch Council. Averill Edwards, National President, spoke persuasively about the benefits of moving ALIA Head Office to Canberra. One of the major benefits of a Canberra base, she said, was the lobbying potential for the Association. She also referred to the need for more libraries, and for library staff to become more knowledgeable about, and skilled in, lobbying techniques! Not in NSW they don't! Sad, isn't it!


Making moves in literacy

Gather together an audience on public librarians, add several literacy workers and librarianship students, and ask them to consider the role of the public library in enhancing the value of life of disadvantaged people in the community. You have, then, a thought-provoking session which throws up challenges to traditional ways of conceiving and planning public library services.

The workshop 'Making moves in literacy' was held at Northcote Public Library on 31 March 1989. It attracted more than forty people. A panel of speakers addressed the following topics:

- What's worked, where? (Chairman: Chris Stewart, DFE, Northeast Region. Speakers: Marie Gaspar, Dandenong Valley Regional Library Service; Jan Hanson, Carringbush Regional Library; George Eraclides, Northcote City Library; Lee Hayles, Council of Adult Education, Access Resource Centre.)
- Resourcing literacy programs. (Speaker: Lee Hayles)
- Access to funding. (Speaker: Judith O'Neill, General Manager, Division of Further Education, Victoria.)

Attention was brought to the issues of staff training, staff sensitivity to the



needs of adult literacy students, the library's role in working with the local community, and resource development.

In discussing the last topic, the speaker emphasised the need to consider identifying people, needs, tutors, coordinators and existing literacy programs before you even start to consider your resource collection. In fact, consider your resource collection last. In addition, don't look to traditional selection sources, go straight to the users (students, tutors and coordinators) and ask them what they want.

Asmall publication will be produced as a result of this workshop. It will address questions of adult literacy for librarians to consider in the context of their own communities.

Future workshops are being planned. The ALIA Literacy Section welcomes feedback, and expressions of interest from librarians and literacy workers in participating in committee meetings and workshop planning.

Remember the focus for 1990 is International Literacy Year, and the
