Budget increase

Colin Taylor, Chief Librarian, South Australian Institute of Technology Library, is pleased to report that, contrary to the trend of most budget announcements in recent years, the Library has had a 60 per cent increase in its non-salary budget. The Institute has allocated 7.4 per cent of its 1990 recurrent budget to the Library, a figure achieved by few Institutes (or Universities) of Technology, but more in line with the longer established Universities. The Library has also been guaranteed at least 10 per cent of any research infrastructure funding received by the Institute.

There have been particular factors which have made this large increase possible in 1990 which cannot, in total, be guaranteed for future years. However, the Institute has signalled its intention to use budget flexibility to maintain a higher level of funding for the Library as a top priority.

He adds that the merger negotiations between the SA Institute of Technology and Flinders University in 1989 provided consciousness raising among Institute financial decision makers about appropriate funding for academic libraries. This has now been exploited with positive results. Even though the merger was aborted, the Institute Library and its users are thankful to the Flinders University Librarian, Bill Cations, and the Flinders University community for their assistance.

Training aids in Zimbabwe

The Training Aids Development Group (TADG) in Zimbabwe is producing excellent adult print materials for literacy programs, for worker development programs and for health education. Its booklets and magazines are aimed particularly at the freedom fighters, now adult, who took up arms in the struggle for independence, and so missed out even on the second class secondary education that was offered to blacks in Rhodesia. The content is correspondingly sophisticated in terms of economics and social theory, but the syntax is appropriately simple.

TADG is funded by a variety of non-government development agencies, with the core costs for its third year being met by the Australian Freedom From Hunger Campaign.
