The second edition of Finding and Keeping, published by ALIA, was compiled by Marjorie Roe, Pam Dunlop and Bert Cornelius. It is a survey of collections in national, state and public libraries; universities and colleges; newspapers and broadcasting agencies; museums and galleries, not to mention organisations such as schools, churches and trade unions.

The guide descriptions (over 500 of them!) include sound and video recordings, photographs, motion pictures and slides/transparencies. Supplementary material such as film posters and record sleeves are also listed.

Ellinor Archer Award 1989

Marjorie Roe, one of the compilers of Finding and Keeping: A researcher's guide to audiovisual resources in Australia had the Ellinor Archer Award conferred on her by the ALIA General Council in 1989, for her significant contribution to the practice of librarianship in Australia, particularly in the area of audiovisual materials.

Following are excerpts of Marjorie Roe's citation:

Throughout her career [Marjorie Roe| has always been an innovator, a creative force. In each of her three short librarian positions, 1953-1967, she took

charge of a library which was under developed or moribund, and made it a major focus of school life. Her periods in each were times of remarkable growth and expansion.

In the new University of Papua New Guinea she established a resource centre of outstanding quality. It gained an international reputation and people came from many countries to inspect and admire its work. In Papua New Guinea she was active on a committee planning the new National Library.

Marjorie Roe engaged in fundamental research, attempting to devise a new formula for the description of audiovisual materials. She has indeed pursued an active interest in research over a long period of time.

Again at the University of Queensland she started the Library's Audio Visual Services from very little and built up a collection and a service which is second to none and well-known in Australia and overseas. She became and remains an acknowledged authority on audiovisual materials, their collection, storage, dissemination and use.

Marjorie Roe has always been excessively modest about her own achievements. She is diffident about her own lack of formal library qualifications, yet her pioneering efforts over more than 30 years and her deep understanding of many aspects of libraries and librarianship have won the respect and admiration of many colleagues, both librarians and academics.
