Self service in the library

Fast Track Issues (FTI) is an initiative of Waverley City Libraries in cooperation with RAECO and General Automation (GA) Australia (AWA Computers). It is an integrated self-service circulation system. The first installation, at the Glen Waverley Library, became operational on Thursday, 2 May 1991.

The FTI system incorporates the RAECO security system, the RAECO Alarm, hardware supplied by GA, and software developed by Skemac-Blustan for use in GA's point of sale solutions and modified for FTI. Hardware components include the RAECO security gates, processor, and security label deactivator and reactivator; a 286 PC with hard disc and colour monitor; a barcode reader/laser scanner on a 'smart stand'; a card swipe unit to read the membership card and a docket printer to record details of the transaction. A keyboard is available for use by the library staff. Messages about overdue books, fines etc. appear on the monitor if appropriate.

FTI will operate in any URICA library regardless of the processor or URICA version, and can be modified to work with any DOS, UNIX or PICK-based systems. It represents a new step forward in library automation, making it possible to work extended hours with fewer

'Frenchship' weeks La francophonie vous parle

The nine diplomatic missions of the French-speaking countries represented in Canberra organised a series of events during the latter half of May to promote the French language. Two libraries took part in the fortnight. The National Library of Australia exhibited interesting and valuable French language publications from the Rare Books Collection. The ANU Menzies Library displayed an exhibition of literature by contemporary French language authors from around the world, including African and Pacific countries. The French embassy will donate the exhibit to the ANU.

Deakin goes Innovative

Deakin University has signed a contract with Innovative Interfaces Inc. of Berkeley California for the purchase of an integrated library system to replace its Dataphase system which was originally installed in 1981. The contract covers software only, with the supporting hardware being supplied locally. Two MIPS 3330 machines will support the system, each with 96 megabytes of memory and 3.9 gigabytes of disc storage. The configuration calls for the database to be duplicated on the two hardware platforms with all transaction processing being conducted on one machine and with continuous updating of the second machine which will support OPAC inquiries.

The University is taking the opportunity to replace some of its staff terminals with X-terminals for concurrent access through the local area network to multiple systems at the one workstation.

Installation and database load will occur during the second half of 1991 for a

changeover in the December-February vacation period. The system will initially support 100 concurrent terminal sessions, but is easily upgradable with the addition of a third CPU. As it did with the Dataphase system, the Gordon Technical College in Geelong will be purchasing a share of the system and contributing to its running costs.

European information association to go ahead

A successful international meeting hosted by the Library Association of the United Kingdom made good progress towards setting up a new organisation linking all library, information and documentation associations in the member states of the European Community. Nearly every relevant organisation was represented at the 2-day meeting held in London on 18 and 19 May. It was agreed in principle to establish the new body by the autumn of 1992.

Questions of detail which a meeting of 40 people could not address in the time available were referred to a Working Group whose secretariat will be provided by NBLC (the Dutch Centre for Public Libraries and Reading). NBLC will also fund the secretariat costs of the Working Group.

The new organisation will act as an interest group for the library and information professions in the European Community. Its main tasks will be to foster communication between its members on European policy questions relevant to them, to represent their views to the European Commission 'whenever a sufficient unanimity allowed' and to keep them informed of initiatives emerging from the Commission which could affect their interests.

TAFE study skills package

The Open College Network of the NSW TAFE Commission has just brought out this package, aimed at adult learners returning to or continuing with study, especially those studying in isolation.

The package is arranged in nine modules: What's in the package, managing your time, setting and achieving your goals, motivation, ways of learning, showing what you know, studying special subjects, coping with exams, and looking after yourself. Each module, of 30 or 40 pages, has a number of common elements, such as where to go for further help. The modules can be studied in any order, depending on the needs of the moment.

It seems a useful tool, in no way tied to the Open College courses and potentially a valuable resource in all libraries serving students.

Die Mauer — the Wall

Monument of the century

Wolfgang Fischer and Fritz von der Schulenburg. Berlin, Ernst & Sohn, 1990. Distributed by DA Books and Journals. \$42.25.

The Berlin Wall was begun on 13 August 1961 and was opened to allow free passage between East and West on 9 November 1989. This beautifully produced book was published in November 1990 to mark the anniversary of that astonishing event, coming out only a few months after the wall was finally demolished in June 1990.

The wall was always an anachronism. It succeeded as a symbol and was effective in stopping the loss of 20 000 East Germans to the West every month — cumulatively, 15 per cent of the population. 'Monument of the century'? Perhaps not, but of enormous importance.

As such, this book will be of great interest to historians, politicians and all who have seen the wall and made the heart-stopping crossing through Checkpoint Charlie. The book's appeal is to the emotions: there are superb photos illustrating the wall's origins, the escapes, the failures, the graffiti, the demolition. A long interview about the wall with Willi Brandt, an essay by one of the authors on his visit to East Berlin and a detailed chronology comprise all the formal text. Otherwise the story is told in the captions to the photographs.

Your Editor was a member of the Berlin garrison during the Blockade of 1948-49 (the Wall's earliest antecedent) and has returned on business a couple of times since to both sides of the wall. He found this book fascinating, disturbing and necessary. Necessary in the sense that only by keeping alive the memory of this monumental enormity perpetrated by one group of human beings on their fellow humans can we try to ensure that it will never happen again.

The intention of the compilers is to publicise the professional skills of academics in order to open up to the wider community a 'sometimes overlooked but undoubtedly valuable pool of knowledge'. This first edition includes details of over 2500 academics

specialising in around 5000 different subject areas, from 14/15th Century Italian Art to Zooplankton. It is a substantial book: A4 format, well bound and made to last, although the next edition is already planned. Book fair in Tehran

There were 750 000 visitors this year and the foreign publishers sold books worth about US\$11 million.
