## **TDK 1992 Australian Audio Book Award**

Virginia Rowland, Award Coordinator, NLA, comments on the winners

HE WINNERS OF the TDK 1992 Australian Audio Book Awards were announced by Rodney Hall, eminent Australian writer and Chairperson of the Australia Council, at a cocktail function in Queen's Hall, Parliament House, Melbourne on 15 September. The function, hosted by the National Library of Australia, was attended by over 150 authors, publishers,

having access to books. The books are recorded with speed levels varying from 40 words per minute to 130 words per minute; usual narration speeds are closer to 170 words per minute or more. The tapes come in a kit with the printed text. The primary target group is people with developmental disabilities, but many users come from adult literacy students, English language students, people with a hearing

narrators, audio book producers, associated interest groups and consumers.

David Marr has succeeded in winning just about all the literature prizes in this country for his book *Patrick White: A Life.* The 36-hour, 25-cassette audio book, is available for sale to public libraries and to individuals with a print handicap. Their service is designed to meet the needs of people whose lack of reading skills prevents them from impairment, migrants; people with dyslexia, people who have sustained head injuries, and others. One hundred and fifty titles are currently available with 30 more about to be launched. The kits are sold to public libraries, TAFE colleges, schools, universities and individuals.
