

## RAECO Award to Monash

**T**HE inaugural RAECO preservation award at Monash has been made to David Coxsedg. The award is given for excellence in the 'Preservation of Library and Archival Materials' elective course offered in Monash's Graduate Department of Librarianship, Archives and Records. It is valued at \$200, consisting of \$50 cash plus conservation products to the value of \$150 selected from the RAECO range.

The award was presented by Sue Noble, Technology Manager for RAECO, at the Department's Alumni annual research seminar, held in Melbourne on 1 August.

David Coxsedg is student in the Master of Arts (Librarianship) degree at Monash. His scientific background provided his study in the preservation elective with an authoritative touch, particularly notable in his essay on preventing mould and mildew growth in libraries.

## 1992 NSW State Awards

**M**inister for the Arts Peter Collins announced the winners of the New South Wales State Literary Awards for 1992 at a presentation function held at the State Library. Mr Collins noted that the overall standard of work suggests that writing and publishing in Australia continue to flourish. They do so in a less favourable economic climate: dollars may be in short supply, but writers continue to write and readers to buy their books. In our cultural life at least, we are still capable of entering into a civilised contract.

**O**N THURSDAY 20 August 1992, the City of Waverley hosted the annual presentation of the Thomas H Woodrow Memorial Trust Awards at the Waverley City Gallery, Wheelers Hill.

These Awards were established to recognise the outstanding contribution made by the late Tom Woodrow to public library service in Camberwell and Waverley. The Award function was the occasion for an address by Lynne Williams from the Australian Children's Television Foundation, who spoke about the role that well-thought-out television programs can play in children's development. She showed increasing links between quality children's television and associated quality print material. She spoke about when the TV should be on and when it should be off.

Complementing the Award presentation function was the Waverley City Gallery's exhibition 'Ron Brooks and Jeff Fisher: Two Illustrators'—the art of children's book illustrations and of book jacket and magazine design. These issues are intertwined with the use of leisure and information materials and their provision to children and adults through public libraries. ■
